**OUR KANSAS LETTER.**  
Harvey County.  
NEWTON, APRIL 3, 79.  
Ed. Post.—To meet some of the frequent and many inquiries made by persons wishing to emigrate to this great Arkansas Valley, we will give the following facts and figures which can be relied upon—

Harvey Co., was created by an act of Legislation approved Feb., 29, 72 and was named after Hon. James M. Harvey at that time Gov. of the State. The Co. was organized the 10, of April following, from which 10 townships of Sedgwick Co., 3 of McPherson and 2 from Marion were procured. In size Harvey Co., is one of the smallest in the State, being 18 miles North and South by 30 East and West, and containing 540 square mile or 345,600 acres of as fine farming land as there is anywhere to be found, it lies within a strip of Country extending from North to South which without exaggeration can be termed the garden spot of the State, we doubt if 40 acres of unutilized Land can be found in the county. Face of Country is 40 per cent bottom 60 upland 2 per cent, forest and 93 Prairie. The general surface is rolling Prairie, with a rich dark loam, yielding in large quantities crops of all kinds, and resisting alike the wet and dry seasons. The Co., is also well watered, as there are 13 creeks flowing through it from North to South. The Population in 71 was 2000 and in March 78 was 8,173. There is a meeting on Saturday to vote \$7,000 in Bonds for another school house in Newton and it is badly needed. The average salary paid to Teachers is \$50.

In settling in a new county the first and greatest consideration is health. This Co. is 1,445 ft. above the Level of the sea. The air is pure and vigorous, it is never damp, it is free from malaria. There is no stagnant water. The nights are always nice and cool even after the warmest days, so that one rises in the morning refreshed and ready for a good day's work. Everything thrives which can be grown in this latitude. Corn on sod yields 30 to 50 bus. per acre and on old ground 40 to 80 bus.—oats and all kinds of vegetables and vines are easily grown, wheat succeeds splendidly and is the coming crop. Cattle and horses fatten very rapidly in the Spring showing that the prairie grass is very nutritious.

The City of Newton is now the largest and most flourishing place west of Emporia on the A. T. & S. T. R. R. It is the County seat of Harvey Co., and has a population of near 9,000. Business of all kinds is represented here and goods can be bought here as cheap as East of the Mississippi Freights added. We have a \$50,000 Opera House, five Churches, 9 dry goods stores, about the size of Schoch Bro's, 13 groceries 3 large Hardware, 4 printing offices, 4 elevators, 5 drug stores, 4 Lumber and 3 coal yards also round house and Machine shops. The Emigration this Spring exceeds that of last year, as the last 4 weeks the increased has averaged 1,000 per day. Come and see for yourself if you want to see whether these are not facts. HARVEY.
