Gov. Hoyt has re-appointed Gen. James V. Latta Adjutant General of Pennsylvania for three years, from June 1st, 1879.

Hendricks says the Presidential ticket of 1880 will not be renominated, as he will not be a candidate for Vice President.

A Resolution to adjourn finally on the 6th of June has passed both branches of the Pennsylvania Legislature. This will make the session one hundred and fifty days, the full time for which they can draw pay.

The Supreme Court has affirmed the decision of Judge Ross of Montgomery county who decided that licensed houses could not sell liquor on any part of election day, and that election day is twenty-four hours long.

Colonel Thomas A. Scott's son Thomas, thirteen years old, died in Philadelphia, on Thursday evening, of Bright's disease. Mrs. Scott returned from Europe about two weeks ago, intending to take her son abroad for his health.

Four thousand and five hundred acres of land, mostly timbered, and supposed to be underlain with coal, in Morgan county, Tenn., were sold in Allegheny, on Monday, as the property of the Mahoning Iron Company, for \$90.

Peter Hordie, against whom true bills were found at Williamsport last week by the grand jury for conspiracy, in connection with H. E. Taylor, was arrested on a bench warrant and brought before the court, when he gave bail in \$8,000 for his appearance.

OUR WEALTH.—The assessed value of all the property of the United States is \$80,000,000,000—an increase of \$20,000,000,000 in twenty-eight years. This is taken as an evidence of the fact that this country is increasing more rapidly in wealth than any other country on the globe.

Captain Wm. B. Hart, who was defeated two years ago for State Treasurer, is again mentioned by his friends in connection with the Republican nomination. As the Captain stood the brunt of a defeat his claim to a re-nomination are certainly very strong.

Elias Hampton was so particular in buying a revolver in a Buffalo store that the clerk inquired for what purpose he wanted it. "I am going to shoot my father-in-law and brother-in-law," he replied. The clerk thought he was joking, but he wasn't, for before night he had lodged a bullet in each of those relatives.

Asa Packer, President of the L. V. R. R., and once a candidate for Governor, on the democratic ticket, died at his home in Philadelphia last week in his 74th year. He was a native of Connecticut. He was of poor parentage, and worked at the carpenter trade in youth, but was worth four million dollars at his death.

Mr. Fernando Wood made the remarkable admission in the House the other day, that the repeal of the election laws was a matter of vital importance to the Democratic party. The Democratic party, he said, could never hope to carry New York as long as the election laws remained unrepaid. Mr. Wood was promptly rebuked by his Confederate associates for this candid admission.

General Grant will leave Yokohama by the next Pacific Mail Steamer, about the last of June, and will reach San Francisco in the neighborhood of July 29. The arrangements for an excursion of citizens to meet him on his arrival have been completed with the leading trunk lines between the East and Omaha, and from there over the roads of the Union and Central Pacific Companies. The programme of arrangements is now preparing and will be made public shortly.

The President must be fully convinced by this time that he was mistaken in the temper of the South, when he thought that conciliatory measures would be responded to in like spirit by them. Few are now disposed to censure him for having held out the olive branch of peace, even though, made under mistaken notions of Southern sentiment, as his action has convinced the doubters at the North that nothing will satisfy them but the complete triumph of their states rights policy. The course of events has served to strengthen the Republican party, and to develop at the north a firmer feeling in defense of the principal that triumphed in the war.

This is an extract from one of Zach Chandler's speech in the United States Senate addressed to the noble Senators:

"After the close of the rebellion you claimed that you were poor; that you were suffering; and we found you poor and suffering; and we found you ragged and we clothed you. We put upon you the robe of American citizenship which you had forfeited, and we killed for you the freed calf and invited you to the feast, supposing that, after being clothed, you were in your right mind; and when we have invited you to the feast, you say, 'We have abandoned the calf and you have abandoned us.'"

More Southern Bores Patriotism.

If any more flags in this country must be furled forever it will be the Stars and Stripes. Yes, sir, that flag will be torn into a thousand shreds and tatters and spit upon by the patriotic people before they will permit a traitor-hand to touch one fold of the bright banners that float over their free, sovereign and separate commonwealths.

Until the Puritan people confess and repent of the infernal crime and treason of invading our sacred soil.

Until the Southern half of this Republic is represented in some of the highest offices of the Federal Army by military chieftains of the old Confederacy.

Until the Free School System is wiped out.

Until every Yankee purpose and practice is eliminated from the social, moral and political fabric of this States-Union.

Until the Republic is restored to the hands of the Southern people and their friends and allies of the William Allen school of politics at the North.—Okolona Southern States.

It will be seen by the highly important report of Treasurer Noyes to the state senate, regarding the condition of the treasury, that there is an actual deficit of over two millions of dollars, and that the outlook is anything but encouraging. With this startling exhibit of the financial condition of the state, it is now time for the legislature to halt in its mad career and introduce the most rigid economy! The present session has been enormously expensive, because it has been continued twice as long as there was any necessity for it, and many wild schemes have been indulged in which only increased the burden on the treasury without any corresponding benefits. In addition to this enormous cost, the greater part of the sessions has been spent in trying to devise some plan for taking several millions of dollars out of the treasury, apparently without any regard as to how the money was to be raised. If some plan is not speedily devised to raise money to meet the present deficit, the treasury will be in a most lamentable condition, and the great state to which we have always pointed with such pride will be virtually bankrupt.

The time has come for action on the part of our law-makers.—Gazette & Bulletin.

A Remarkable Suit of Clothes. The Emperor of Austria has just been presented with a remarkable suit of clothes. The wool from which the garments were made was upon the sheep's backs eleven hours before the suit was completed. At 6:08 in the morning the sheep were sheared; at 6:11 the wool was washed; at 6:37 dyed; at 6:50 picked; at 7:34 the last carding process was finished; at 8:12 the spin; at 8:15 spooled; at 8:37 the warp was in the loom; at 8:43 the shuttles were ready; at 11:10 seven and three-quarters ell of cloth were completed; at 12:03 the cloth was fulled; at 12:14 washed; at 12:17 sprinkled; at 12:31 dried; at 12:45 sheared; at 1:07 napped; at 1:10 brushed and at 1:15 pressed and ready for the shears and needle. At five o'clock the suit consisting of a hunting jacket, waistcoat and pantaloons was finished.

It may be noted as an event in railroad building, that on Tuesday afternoon the Denver, South Park and Pacific railroad, now being pushed towards Leadville, reached the Kenosha Summit, 10,140 feet above the level of the sea, with the track, and the first passenger train soon afterwards followed. This is the highest point yet reached by a railroad in this country. Sherman, on the Union Pacific railroad, being only 8,242 feet above sea level. It will not be long till the road is completed to Leadville and the famous winding town will be in direct communication with the outer world.

Eighteen bars have been closed in Altoona, one in Hollidaysburg, and two in Tyrone, on account of license having been refused them at the late session of the Blair county court.

The Altoona car works were destroyed by fire on the 23rd ult., causing a loss of \$15,000. About fifty workmen are thrown out of employment.
