Hints About Help.

Have a distinct understanding with the hired help—both those on the farm and those in the house—as to service, amount of wages, time of payment, hours of labor, and the usual duties to be performed, so far as they can be outlined.

Leave nothing unsaid or undone at the beginning of the season, that may lead to misunderstandings, hard feeling, or the breaking of contracts when in the midst of hard work.

In bargaining with them, do not ask of help to promise things that you know to be over-exacting. Demand a full day's work every time, and pay for that work promptly at the time specified in your agreement.

Give help good tools, and exact good usage and care of them.

Instruct men who handle teams, or have charge in any way of the domestic animals of the farm, to treat them with kindness, feed them properly, and care for them as if their own property; and discharge those who disobey such instruction, for they are costing you money that they do not earn. Cruelty to animals is an expensive indulgence.

Impress upon hired men and upon your own sons the importance of thoroughness in their work. It is not alone how much they accomplish, but how perfectly it is done as well.

Set a good table for farm hands. It is not cake, pies, and saucers, but good bread, a variety of meats and plenty of vegetables and fruit that they crave, and that constitute the most healthful and strengthening diet.

Early Corn.

A correspondent of 17ok's Magazine gives the following directions for bringing corn to maturity early in the season adding that he picked corn last year inside of sixty days from the time of planting: "Let the conditions of the soil and manure be the best you can command, and aside from the frequent weeding and hoeing, stirring the ground thoroughly, thin the stalks to three or four, three is best if you would have the largest ears and most of them—Pluck out unmercifully every sucker and non-bearing stalk—that process alone will hasten your corn a week or ten days, as I have come to believe from experiment. I have added this year a top dressing at the hill, when the corn was well up—a compost of one part plaster, two parts ashes, and two parts fine manure, which I think, has been a great advantage."

Those who wish early corn should not only have for seed what is called "an early kind," but they should obtain it from as far North as possible. Seed corn raised in Canada and taken South will come to perfection one, two or three weeks earlier than that ripened on the spot. The reason is that the seed raised in the North has adapted itself to a short season. This is true, in a great measure, of all seeds.

Composition for Hen Roosts.

A correspondent of the Poultry Yard recommends the following method for making perches for fowls: Make a trough for the roosts by nailing lath on both edges of a piece of scantling or board three inches wide, projecting upwards half an inch or more. Fill this trough with mortar, into which has been put to one pint of mortar half a pound of sulphur, half a pint of crude carbolic acid, and half a pint of kerosene. If you want the mortar to set quickly add one pound of calcined plaster, such as dentists use for casts. Mix thoroughly. The mortar can be knocked out easily, and removed once or twice a year. Have your roosts loose, so they may be turned over bottom side up in very cold weather, to guard against freezing the fowls' feet by contact with the cold mortar. Poultrymen will find this much more effective than patent eggs, &c., as the whole flock sit on the roost ten or twelve hours every day, instead of a part of them a few minutes, when they are laying. The above is neither expensive nor troublesome to make, and should be used by everybody who keeps fowls.

Insect Pests.

No quarter should be given to the pests which remain year after year simply because we permit them. The potato beetle exists so plentifully because some careless farmers actually breed myriads of them. Many fields of potatoes were abandoned to them last year, and the neighboring country was thus stocked for this year. This is one insect that might be abolished by a combined effort for a year or two. Another is the cattle gad fly, which may be found now in the banks of the river and oxen in the fields or in the barns, called warble. The grubs may be squeezed through the nostrils and destroyed. The sheep and horse bot, which is now abundant, may be destroyed by the use of kerosene.
