

THE NEW FISH LAW. Full Text of the Recent Act of Assembly.

The following is the bill passed by the Legislature, and will no doubt be signed by the Governor: An Act providing for the propagation and protection of fish and appropriating moneys therefor.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted, etc. That the sum of twenty thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated for expenditure during the present and coming two fiscal years of moneys in State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to be paid by the State Treasurer on the warrant or warrants, of the said Commissioners, or a majority of them, for the purpose of hatching and propagating useful tribes of fish and to stock and supply all the streams, lakes and fresh waters of the Commonwealth with the same, by distributing the imprugated spawn or fry of the said tribes of the State, under proper regulation; and for the dissemination of any varieties of fish in the waters of the State, and to employ the necessary labor, material and implements therefor, and to pay the necessary and reasonable expenses of said fishery commissioners, and the salaries of the fish wardens and water bailiffs they may appoint; provided that the said commissioners shall file annually with the Auditor General an account of all moneys expended and services rendered and pro-fess and file the proper vouchers for the same.

SECTION 2. The State Fishery Commissioners are hereby authorized and required to cause to be constructed by contract with the lowest and best bidder or bidders, after due public notice, approved fishways for anadromous fishes in the public streams of the State as follows: One in the Columbia dam in addition to the one therein erected by the Fishery Commissioners by the act of Assembly, of Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and seventy three, and if deemed feasible and advisable by said board, a modification of the original fishway constructed in the year eighteen hundred and eighty one, and one in the Susquehanna river, to be built and constructed in a substantial manner in the most approved method to admit of the passage of fish, and so as to do no unnecessary injury to said dams for the purpose for which they are now used; provided, that the Columbia dam, as well as the remodeling of the old one if deemed advisable, shall be completed during the year 1879 and the others in succession in their order named, the Clark's Ferry and Shamokin and one in the Juniata, to be constructed during the year 1880. If the Fishery Commission shall first file with the Auditor General a certificate that in their opinion the said fishways in the Columbia dam have been successful for the passage of migratory and anadromous fishes.

SECTION 3. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to fish with any kind of nets, or seines, or any other method of entrapping fish, except with rod, hook or line, within one fourth of a mile of the Columbia dam, or any part of the said dams in which the said fishways are constructed in any manner, or by any device, hinder, or obstruct, the free approach to, and passage through, and over the said fishways, of any such fish, and any person, or persons, so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, one-half to the informer and the other half for the use of the county, wherein such conviction is had, and undergo an imprisonment for a term of not less than six months or more than two years, or both, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 4. It shall not be lawful for any person, or corporation using said dam, to obstruct the said fishways without the consent of the Fish Commissioners either for the purpose of raising the water in the pools of the said dams, or any other purpose, and any such obstruction shall be deemed a nuisance, and may be abated by any citizen or fish warden, or water bailiff of this Commonwealth, and any such person, or corporation, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor; and on conviction thereof shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, one-half to the informer and the other half for the use of the county wherein such conviction is had, and suffer an imprisonment for a term of not less than six months, or more than three years, or both, at the discretion of the court under the circumstances of the case, and when the nuisance shall be in existence at the time of the conviction and sentence, it shall be lawful for the court to direct either the defendant, any fish warden, or the sheriff of the proper county at the expense of the defendant to abate the same.

SECTION 5. For the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of this act the sum of thirty thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated, and no moneys shall be paid out of the State Treasury under the provisions of this act, except upon a warrant of the Auditor General upon a certificate or certificates of the said Fishery Commissioners, or a majority thereof from time to time, that the services have been rendered or work done in accordance with this act, provided, that not more than fifteen thousand shall be used in the construction and remodeling of fishways in the Columbia dam.
