M. S. GRAY, Chairman State Committee. Phila. June 9, 1879. Since the adjournment of Congress the country is enjoying low tide in politics. The public debt statement for June shows an increase of \$24,788,148 during the month. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1879, there has been a decrease of the debt amounting to \$8,579,575 43. The total debt less cash in the Treasury, on the first of July, amounts to \$2,027,207,256 37, of which \$1,991,716,110.00 is bearing interest. The issues most prominent at the State elections this year in Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania are by this time well known and sharply defined. They relate to honest money, the maintenance of the national credit unimpaired, the defense of specie payments, the national banking system, and the enforcement of the laws. Nullification can not stand fire in such States. King Cetewayo, whose real name is Charles Manaway, was born of mulatto parents at Uniontown, Fayette county, March 8, 1838. He served in the Crimean war. He was in the American service during the war with England, and finally found his way to Zululand, where by his knowledge of war and ability he rose in 1869 to chief and in 1871 to King. It is some time since a Charley Ross has been found, and a little interest is therefore awakened by the report from Quebec that a boy has been discovered there who claims to be the Germantown lad stolen five years ago. Unless there is some very decided mark by which the parents can identify the long lost boy there is little probability that identity can be established after so long a period. Nevertheless, it is said that Mr. Ross will journey to Canada to examine the lad. It is pretty loudly hinted that there will be an extra session of the legislature next winter to pass the charitable appropriation bills that failed by reason of an "oversight" on the part of certain Senate clerks. If this should be the case it will cost the State a large amount of money, and it may occur to the Senators that those who are responsible for it should be promptly dismissed, and more careful or conscientious men put in their places. The iron trade is reported to be in a very healthy condition at present. All the pig iron manufactured is speedily consumed, whilst all the rail mills are working to their fullest capacity, with more orders than they can fill. Compared with this time last year the prices of iron rails have advanced five dollars per ton, steel rails three dollars, and pig iron one or two dollars. The product of pig iron, bar iron and rails this year is expected to exceed that of any previous year in the history of the country. The Chambersburg Repository says the census of 1879 will increase the members of Congress from the Northern States, while the South will lose. It is estimated that the population of the United States next year will not fall below 48,500,000. If the number of representatives in the popular branch of Congress be fixed at 300, the North will have a gain of 14 members, the South losing 7 members, making practically a gain of 21 members for the North. This will give the Northern States fully a two-thirds vote in the electoral college. Some of the New England States, it is estimated, will lose on account of the heavy emigration to the west Kansas and Iowa are expected each to gain four members, Illinois, Michigan and Minnesota each three members. This readjustment is not to take place until after the next Presidential election. If it were operative next year, the solid South added to the electoral vote of all the Northern States which the democrats have any chance of carrying, would not elect a rebel brigadier or one of his northern allies President.

TERRIBLE STORM. HARRISBURG, July 11.—The storm which passed through the Juniata valley this afternoon did an immense amount of damage in this county. It was particularly destructive in Millin, about fifty miles west of this city, on the Pennsylvania Railroad. The storm continued about half an hour, destroying much property and fruit. The roofs of the Presbyterian and Methodist Churches were blown off, and both buildings badly damaged, especially the former, which occupies an exposed position. The Lutheran Church also suffered by the storm. The roof of Graybill Hall was swept away. Portions of two other buildings were blown down, and seventeen more or less damaged. The tin roof of the Patterson Hotel was raised and the house flooded with water. Portions of the roof of the railroad company's shop and stable were blown off. Mrs. Bresswell, aged 80 years, was instantly killed by a piece of timber which was hurled through her house. Her face was mutilated almost beyond recognition. Among the heaviest losers were Showers & Sholl, carriage manufacturers. In Lewistown two or three buildings were blown down. Hundreds of trees were uprooted by the storm and the telegraph poles and wires were prostrated for long distances. YELLOW FEVER PANIC. MEMPHIS, July 10.—The Board of Health this morning issued the following: To the People of the City of Memphis:—We would say, quietly remove your families to places of safety, until we can at least see whether the few cases of yellow fever will assume an epidemic form. The people along the lines of the different routes of travel, we can say there can be no danger of infection for many days to come. SECOND DISPATCH. MEMPHIS, July 10.—Five new cases are reported this morning, and one death, an infant of Judge J. E. R. Ray, of the Criminal court, who, together with another son is prostrated with the disease. A perfect stampede of citizens is in progress, trains being unable to carry away hundreds who are ready to leave. THIRD DISPATCH. MEMPHIS, July 10.—At this hour (two p. m.) there has been no change in the situation. The great desire of every one is to leave the city before the fever spreads. NEW YORK, July 8th. A private letter from Mr. John Russell Young, who is traveling with Gen. Grant's party, says that Gen. Grant has concluded to visit Australia before returning to this country, and that he probably will not reach America until the spring of 1880. Young has made it is believed here that General Grant will remain abroad until after the Republican nominating convention as, in the event he is nominated he will have the honor of being chosen while out of the country, and in the event he is not nominated he can return with the prestige of his foreign tour unaffected, and can retire to private life without suffering from an apparent defeat of his ambitious purposes. Mr. George W. Childs, now at Long Branch, said to a friend yesterday that after visiting Japan he thought that Gen. Grant would return to China, and then go to Australia, as he knew him to be anxious to visit Australia. THE COAL TRADE.—The Philadelphia Ledger says "the anthracite coal trade presents a most encouraging outlook. All the elements of a prosperous trade stand out conspicuously. Though the supply of coal to the end of the first summer month is about four and three quarter millions of tons in excess of last year's production to the same date the stock of coal on hand was never before so light, except, perhaps, during some long strike. The piers at Port Richmond are nearly bare of coal; the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, and the Lehigh Navigation Company all and severally make the same statement, namely, that their orders for coal are so very full that they cannot meet them; they also announce an increase in the prices of from five to fifteen cents per ton. The New York coal companies also announce higher prices."
