Death of Col. Henry C. Eyer. The subject of this notice died at his home in Selinsgrove at about 2 o'clock on Sunday morning, August 8, 1879, from a cancer in the face. Col. Eyer was born at Haverstron, Lebanon county, June 21, 1797, and was at his death aged 82 years, one month and nine days. His parents moved to the vicinity of Selinsgrove when the Colonel was quite young yet, and they both died when about middle age. The greater part of the Colonel's life was devoted to agriculture; but for about thirty years he resided in town, where he had an elegant residence and where he enjoyed the fruits of his early labors at ease. He was a man of tall form and serene constitution, and had the vigor and vitality to make him a conspicuous figure for two physical infirmities—a broken leg which he got by a fall from a wagon and which made him a cripple on crutches for life and a cancer in the face which finally was the cause of his death. He was married to Miss Mary Davis, a daughter of James K. Davis, deceased, and who survives him. He died without issue, and left a valuable estate. In politics he was always a Democrat; in matters of religion he adhered to the fatherhood and was a leading member of that denomination. In matters of charity and benevolence he was peculiarly liberal, and would freely give where his contributions were needed or would be used. He lost much by being robbed in those who really did not deserve his aid, but he would make no distinction as to those who were worthy or unworthy.

In 1839 he received the Democratic nomination for State Senator in the 11th Senatorial District, composed of the counties of Perry, Mifflin, Juniata, Union and Huntingdon. He was elected, but was elected out of the office by gross fraud in Youngstown's township, Huntingdon county, where his opponent had more votes than there were voters in the township. His Democratic friends and other prominent men urged him to contest the election, but he refused to do so. He was again nominated, and this time he was elected and served his full term. He afterwards was nominated for Congress in the District composed of the counties of Snyder, Dauphin, Lebanon, and two townships in Northumberland county. The competitor was Hon. John G. Bland of Harrisburg, and although he made a big vote, the district politically was too strong against him to produce its very large majority.

Considering that he was rated as a Senator and pursued his calling the greater part of his life, he was not a man of ordinary talents for success and was an expert in the management of his property. He was the author of a music book which sold for years in various parts of the country, and the sale of which yielded him a very considerable income. In business and his daily walk and conversation, he manifested a disposition of mind that was commendable. Peace, order and good will seemed to predominate. He looked upon himself as a citizen and not a politician. He was a man of a certain bookishness, but his mind was not a narrow one in a narrow point of view. 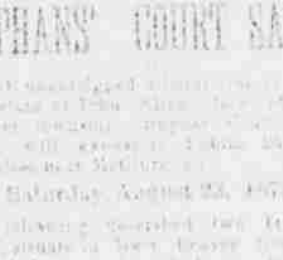
