The receipts of wheat at Philadelphia on Wednesday last were enormous, amounting to 448,600 bushels. This is the largest amount ever received in that place in a single day.

During the month of July the Cambria iron company and Gaiter steel company, of Johnstown, paid to the Pennsylvania railroad company, for freight, the sum of \$84,000.

The New York Herald correspondent traveling with Gen. Grant around the world, writes that the General will start for America the last week of August.

The Prohibitionists have issued a call for a State Convention to be held at Altoona on the 9th of September. It is expected that a State ticket will be nominated and an address issued.

President Gowen, of the Philadelphia and Reading railroad, sailed on Saturday from Liverpool for this country. He is said to have been remarkably successful in securing all the financial aid he desired.

In convention of the State camp of the Patriotic Order of Sons of America, at Lebanon, J. S. Smith, of Reading, was elected State President, and H. J. Stager, of Philadelphia, State Secretary, for the ensuing year.

A Washington special says that Hon. H. G. Fisher, acting chairman of the Republican Congressional Committee, is keeping things quite lively at headquarters, and is receiving numerous letters congratulating him upon the vigorous aid rendered by the committee under his direction.

The New York Tribune says that in an interview with the venerable Thurlow Weed, the latter stated that Secretary Everts told him a few days ago that some foreign mission would be given to Galusha A. Grow, of Pennsylvania. An appointment could not be given to a more worthy or competent man.

CAUSED TO DIE.—An accident in which five people—the conductor, two brakemen, a newsboy and a deaf mute—were killed outright, took place on the 14th inst., on one of the two railroads connecting Philadelphia and Atlantic City. The accident was caused by two trains colliding.

The announcement of the death of Mrs. Nellie Grant Sartoris, far from the home of her childhood, will be received with pangs of sorrow by her many friends in America, where she will be remembered as a bright and amiable girl rather than as the matronly woman into which she had matured.

The United States having passed over the hard times, Canada has commenced to experience them. All accounts say that industrial establishments are failing, labor is seeking employment, banking institutions are bursting, strikes are numerous among workmen, and a sense of insecurity extensively prevails.

The New York Sun, a Democratic paper, if anything, says there is an increasing probability that the Republicans will carry the State of New York this fall. If the Republicans nominate a good man for Governor, and they doubtless will, they will carry the State by a handsome majority, and that will insure the State for the Republican candidate for President in 1880.

It is stated, on what appears to be excellent authority, that the exodus of colored men from the Southern States into Kansas and adjoining States and territories is taking a fresh impetus. There is more system about the movement now than there has been heretofore, hence it attracts less attention. There is no truth whatever in the statements published in some of the Northern papers that the colored men who have gone to Kansas are dying of starvation and suffering every conceivable ill. The white people of Kansas, especially the prosperous farmers, are doing much for the new comers in the way of furnishing them employment, and that is all the negroes ask. Give them work, fair wages and decent treatment and there will be no trouble. No locality in the west will be over-crowded by them.

offering a reward for the apprehension of Albright, who an atrociously unscrupulous young Miller, at Montgomery's Ferry one day last week, by deliberately shooting him with a pistol as he sat in the house of a friend. A reward of two hundred and fifty dollars has been offered for his capture, and we are informed that a number of parties have started to search for him. There is something very singular about this murder. Albright left a note, stating that the woman should be protected, and that he had taken upon himself that duty by slaying his rival. Again the woman claims that she was married to Miller on the 3rd of July, but it is known that he was engaged a greater portion of that day in Harrisburg, receiving visiting friends. Up to the present time she has failed to produce a marriage certificate, and the affair is wrapped in greater mystery than ever.

Two women Mrs. Miller, and Mrs. Heine of Philadelphia with their children left their homes on Friday morning to spend the day in Fairmount Park. While they were crossing the Pennsylvania Railroad bridge which spans the Reading Railroad tracks, in the Park, a train came suddenly upon them. The children ran and got over the bridge in safety, but Mrs. Heine was struck by the engine which threw her against Mrs. Miller knocking them both over the bridge onto the track below. Mrs. Miller was killed instantly and Mrs. Heine died shortly after. The scene was agonizing when the little ones realized the nature of the calamity.

The Fever Increasing. MEMPHIS, Aug. 14.—Forty new cases of yellow fever were reported to the Board of health to-day, thirty of whom were colored. Ten interments were reported by the undertakers. The weather is warm.

MEMPHIS, August 17.—Twenty-five cases were reported to the Board of Health to-day, fifteen of whom are colored. Several additional cases of persons stricken beyond the corporation line have also been reported. The weather is clear and cool.

Residents of Mahanoy City are in a chronic state of excitement from an impending danger that portions of the town will one of these days sink into a coal shaft underneath. One of the Gangways of the Ellwood colliery undermines part of the town, and when shales are fired by the miners the report is distinctly heard and the ground is so shaken that window glass are frequently broken. The neighborhood is thickly populated.

Governor Hoyt on Friday last issued the warrants for the execution of the two Mollie Maguire, Peter McMannus and John O'Neil convicted in Northumberland county for the murder, in 1874, of Frederick Hensar, Coroner of that county. Also for the execution of Andrew Tracy, of McKean county who killed a woman, who did not reciprocate his affections. The hangings will occur on October 9th.
