THE REPUBLICAN TRIUMPH COMPLETE.

Returns indicating a Majority of 25 000 and the Control of the Legislature on Joint Callot.

IOWA SOLID.

Returns show that Charles Foster has been elected Governor by a large majority, and that the Republicans have also carried the Legislature, which will give them a gain of a Senator in place of Senator Thurman, whose term will expire on the 4th of March, 1881. This latter result is the more gratifying as it was in a greater degree than the election of the State ticket, as the members of both parties were opposed to this important issue.
