New Horses become blind.

One of the worst eye traps known is the abominable bay rack, whose the horse has to knock up and pull the bay down, biting him in, fore-leg, and, worst of all, his eyes with bay and, if not or whatever may be mixed with the gossamer. These traps are met with nearly everywhere throughout the land. These throw the horse in the most unnatural position for feeding, as the natural position is to knock down and pull up, not to knock up and pull down, as these bay racks make them do. Inarching up to eat it exposes the forehead, face and eyes to wood, chaff and dirt, which, getting in the eyes at any time. We will speak now of the abuse that horsemen resort to in controlling a horse. The worst of all is in striking him over the head with leather strap, your fist, a club or whip. Shame on a man that would dare to club over the weaker of creation next to man! But I am sorry to say we find great many now-a-days who take delight in hitting on their wagon seats and trying to see how close they can send the point of a cracker to the horse's ear, or strike some particular spot on the back of the head, neck or shoulders. But my word for it, a man who will practice this, comes to grief sooner or later. Instinct tells the horse to be careful of his brain, and especially of his eyes, for when they are gone that ends his seeing, as they can never be restored or new ones put in, as we all know. Therefore, never strike a horse about the head. The number of horses' eyes hurt by slipping the勒子over the head would surprise us all if known. A horse's head, with a good eye, setting out boldly on a square face, is a hard thing to stop a stiff collar over without rubbing and bruising the eye. Next, we have the stable to contend with, and it produces more weak eyes than any other one thing we know of. The gases arising from the body are noxious to the eyes. Let a man stand over a pile of warm decomposing manure and see how quickly it affects the eyes. But he thinks nothing about the horse in his closely confined stall with no ventilation either above or below to carry away this poison. Set your stables up from the ground, give ventilation underneath so as to confine this gas and compel it to rise through the cracks in the floor. Also, pat good ventilation high above the horse's head to cause a current of air to carry off this poison as it generates. Always give the horse plenty of light, but not through a small hole; make it large so as not to condense the rays as they come through a small opening. Never whitewash a stall, as white is very bad on the eyes. Take a sheet of white paper and hold it before your eyes a short time and see its effects; but you can turn your head and look away from it while the horse cannot, as he is tied up with a white sheet all round him. Never whitewash a stall, but always use blue, as it will never hurt the eyes.

Ants, Roaches and Bedbugs.

The Scientific American says: "To thoroughly rid a house of red and black ants, cockroaches, spiders, bedbugs, and all the crawling pests which infest our houses, take two pounds of alum and dissolve it in three or four quarts of water. Let it stand on the fire till the alum disappears, then apply it with a brush while nearly boiling hot, to every joint and crevice in your closets, bedsteads, pantry shelves, and the like. Brush the crevices in the floor of the shirting or mop boards, if you expect they will harbor vermin. Cock-roaches will flee the point which has been washed in camphor water. If, in white-washing a ceiling, plenty of alum is added to the lime, it will serve to keep insects at a distance."

The Wheat Weevil.

This little pest is not, as many suppose, brought in from the field, but works upon the grain after it is stored. In its perfect state it is a little beetle, one-eighth of an inch long, and has great powers of multiplication—a single beetle is said to produce 6,000 eggs. The eggs are deposited on the housed grain, and, soon hatched, the grub eats at once into the interior of the grain, and in time leaves only an empty hull. Fumigating the granary with sulphur is a remedy; the spraying of air-slacked lime has been recommended. If the granary is badly infected, it is better to change the place for a year or two, and starve them out.
