The distress in Ireland is reported to be increasing, notwithstanding the relief that is being furnished from both sides of the Atlantic. Fully a quarter of a million of Irish people are now dependent upon charity for continental existence.

In the Congressional district conventions held in Indiana on Wednesday a choice of delegates to the convention, Blaine men were chosen in all the districts except one. The single exceptional district instructed for Mr. Sherman. Instructions were given in nearly all the districts for both first and second choice, the latter being invariably for Washburne. The western States generally appear to be very largely in favor of Blaine; it being doubtful if even in Illinois an Ogle can be sent out entirely.

Dennis Kearney has conceived the idea that there is a conspiracy on foot in San Francisco for his assassination, and in a speech at a Hoodlum meeting the other night he stated that he'd leave in the hands of certain parties a list of names of persons who were to be guillotined by the working men in the event of his (Kearney's) assassination. It must be true that Kearney's power is waning or he would not be compelled to resort to such petty trickery to keep himself in place at the head of the Workmen's party.

Philadelphia county at one time was as solidly Democratic as Berkeley and the city was the Gibraltar of the Whig party. It never wavered. The act of consolidation was passed in the interest of the Democrats; that the Whig majority in the city might be swayed by the Democrats in the county, but it didn't work as its projectors intended. The Democratic party there, as now, is but the shadow of its former self. Democracy can find no rest for the sole of its foot in Philadelphia.

A San Francisco manufacturing firm have been prosecuted for violating the article of the new constitution of the State which prohibits the employing of Chinese labor. The firm in question had been notified months ago to discharge all Chinese employees, and threatened with suspension of consequences if they refused. They claimed that the provision of the State constitution which they violated is in direct antagonism with the constitution of the United States as well as contrary to the spirit and genius of a free government and they refused to make their own a test case. They further declare that if they cannot have control over their own business, and supply want they place in California as they will take their capital and banish into some other State where at least ordinary rights are respected.

The latest aspect of the Curtis Yocum contest is of such a character as to leave the impression that Mr. Yocum will be defeated without a dissenting voice from any man here except the Greenbackers. Yocum and all the other Greenbackers have pledged themselves to vote in favor of ousting Mr. Washburne of Minnesota, who was elected by over three thousand majority and of seating Mr. Ignatius Donnelly Yocum afterwards attempted to judge a vote on seating Donnelly by pretending that sixteen in his family called him home. The Republicans have become so thoroughly disgusted with Yocum's character and tricks that they will probably make a million water to save him. The Greenbackers will apparently all vote to oust Mr. Washburne not that there is any doubt that he was elected by a large majority, but because his opponent, Donnelly, is an infatuated Greenbacker of the worst character.

It has been remarked by other nations that the United States officials are more easily corrupted than those of any other country. For this opinion of us by the world the newspapers are very much to blame for the shameless attacks each party makes on the other to get into power itself or to get the other out. And yet the vast revenues of the United States are collected, including contributions, at a less rate per cent than those of any nation on earth. Great Britain has the name of corruptly punishing delinquent officials, and yet smuggling can be carried on in London within ten feet of a custom house officer or one has only a solitary pound of tobacco to bribe his British official.
