Ex Governor Robinson of New York, who ought to know, assures no anxious public that Mr. Tilden would accept the nomination for President. That question may now be considered settled.

Mr. T. S. Tuttle, of Cincinnati, Ohio, advertises that he will bet \$100 against \$100 that Samuel J. Tilden will not receive the Democratic nomination for President. Tilden should encourage somebody to take that bet.

The report made to the Senate by Hill, in behalf of the majority of the Committee on Privileges and Elections, with reference to the Kellogg-Spoofford case, is perhaps the most prejudiced, unfair, malicious, and indecent that has ever emanated from a Senate committee. It shows throughout the personal spite and hatred which Hill bears Kellogg and which he makes no attempt to conceal. It gives promise to and lays stress on evidence given by self-confessed purjurers and penitentiary birds, and ignores entirely all evidence given by respectable witnesses in behalf of Kellogg. Senator Hill and Senator Kellogg fittingly stigmatized this majority report on the floor of the Senate when it was presented, and the last named Senator dealt Hill some hard knocks of a personal character such as are seldom suffered by the presiding officer of the Senate to be made by one Senator against another. It is said that Hill is making this attack upon Kellogg for the purpose of drawing public attention from himself which has lately been attracted to him by reason of the infamous scandal in which he has become involved. This is probably what Kellogg meant when he challenged Hill to a comparison of moral character and of rights and at the question of any tribal compact of Georgia.
