While justly protesting that the solid South is against us in the election, it is consistent or wise to count on the solid South to control the nomination.

"Uncle Samuel," has gathered in the Beaver county delegates to the Democratic State convention, in connection with those from Allegheny and Lawrence counties. Mr. Wallace will have to call a halt pretty soon if he expects to save Pennsylvania Democracy from the "error of its ways."

The Phoenixville Messenger says it has seen a private letter from Governor Hoyt, in which he states that under no circumstances would he consent to have his name brought before the Chicago convention in connection with the Vice-Presidency. Governor Hoyt now holds an office second in importance only to the Presidency of the Republic, and he appreciates it.

Mr. Weaver of Iowa got his famous currency resolution before the House at last, and is probably as happy as a man can be who has seen his pet idea buried under an adverse majority of more than thirty votes, or as John Phoenix was when he thrashed the editor of the San Diego Herald by inserting his nose between the editor's teeth.

Gen Logan authorizes the statement that Illinois will send a solid Grant delegation to Chicago, and that the ex-President will be nominated on the first ballot. He says the Illinois people do not know the Republicans of Illinois as well as he does, and are sadly missing the mark in their calculations. Gen. Grant's prospects depend very largely, if not wholly, on the Republicans of his own State.

The more Mr. Springer explains the better light he stands in. When a Democrat, and a pronounced Democrat like the Illinois Representative, openly informs the "great defrauded" through his representative that he can control his vote in his own words, "that he is not Mr. Tilden's man," there is tolerable good evidence that the Gramercy Park Statesman's lien on the party is being lifted and the chattels are becoming emancipated.

In utter fearlessness of Senator Wallace President Hayes yesterday sent to the Senate again the nomination of Dr. Sherwood to be supervisor of this census district, and in utter disregard of the President, Senator Wallace had the Senate summarily reject. Mr. Wallace is doubtless resolved to punish Speaker Randall even if every applicant for a position as enumerator in this city has to wait until next July to know who to apply to for appointment. As for the community, it doesn't seem to be considered at all in the matter.

The New York World makes a heartrending appeal to ex Governor Horatio Seymour to come to the front and assume the leadership of the Democratic party in New York. Mr. Seymour is doubtless very popular with his own party in his own State, but of what avail would it be to the party if he should accept the invitation of the World? Men, however popular, cannot successfully assume leadership except at the call, or by the consent, of those who are to be led. So long as Kelley and Tilden do not endorse the invitation even Seymour would not be accepted as a harmonizer and leader.

There are numerous indications that there will be contests for a majority of the seats in the Democratic State convention, and unless the bitterness now prevailing between the Wallace and Randall factions be materially modified the biggest row that has yet been witnessed in a convention of the Pennsylvania Democracy will ensue. Charges and counter-charges of fraud follow the selection of delegates in nearly every county, and the best faction at once proceeds to get a contesting delegation in the field. As the Democrats have abandoned all hope of carrying this State in November at the ballot box they have nothing of a substantial character at stake, and can therefore fight to their hearts' content for the delegates to the national convention.

The example set by the management of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in dealing with its employees will attract attention and receive favorable comment throughout the country. Col. Scott, the President of the Company, has issued a circular announcing that on April 1st the pay of all persons in the employ of the Pennsylvania Company will be restored to what it was previous to the reduction of June 1, 1877. This is generous and just. The present increased earnings of the company warrant the restoration of wages to the figures prevailing in the more prosperous times, and Col. Scott does not wait for the men to make any demand or threaten strikes but orders the increase of wages voluntarily. If all corporations and employers of labor were governed by so honorable and just a policy toward their employees there would be fewer strikes and a restoration of mutual confidence and good-will between capital and labor.

A great sensation has been created in Mexico on account of the bitter denunciation of its government and people by a Spanish newspaper.

The Butler county murderer, Le Favre, convicted in the second degree, is 65 years old, and seems perfectly indolgent.

The Commissioners of Cambria county have consulted architects in reference to building a new court house in that county.

Ann Carr, a young Irish girl who came to Scranton six months ago from Ireland, has become hopelessly insane from home sickness.

Willie Clifton, of Easton, fell over an embankment, a distance of 80 feet, and escaped with no greater injury than a broken wrist.

The Calpepper (Va) Times nominates John W. Garrett of the Baltimore & Ohio railroad, for President of the United States.

Mr. James Pippin has very properly been chosen vice-president of a fruit grower's protective association of Ridgely, Maryland.

Sunset Cox tells the Independent that when a good little Sunday school boy (a long time ago) he learned by heart and recited all of St. Paul's Epistle to the Romans.

Dr. Doane, of Williamsport, informs the Gazette and Bulletin that General Washington died of diphtheria, and that he has the documents to prove it.

Rev. Geo. F. Cain, the retiring pastor of the First Presbyterian Church at Williamsport, has been presented with a purse of \$300 in gold by the members.

Recent developments seem to leave very little ground for any other opinion than that the Rev. C. H. Coon, of Reading, has been made the victim of blackmailing.

The report of the Indian Investigating committee states that Commissioner Hayt was not guilty of corruption in the administration of his office, whatever else he may have done.

Robinson, Rix & Co., machinists of Pittsburg, have brought suit against the Pittsburg and Lake Erie Railroad for \$55,000 damages sustained by defendants running tracks through the yards of the plaintiffs.

The murder of old farmer Miller at Jersey Shore, Lycoming county, on Thursday night, as told by his wife and her paramour, George Smith in their confession, was a deed of shocking brutality. A negro named Brown has been arrested for complicity in the murder.

Mr. Hutchins (N. Y.), member of Congress, wants to suppress the New York Evening Post for publishing an article reflecting on the House for its cowardice in not directing the Ways and Means committee to report back the several tariff bills.

The first County Convention in Ohio instructs its delegates in favor of Mr. Blaine. Mr. Sherman's forces just there seem to be out of repair.

Mr. Tilden fears the fame of Horatio Seymour as much as the force of John Kelly. He refused to let his New York convention go to Utica in order to escape the influence of the one, and unsuccessfully attempted a corner on all the hotels in Syracuse to shut out the presence of the other.

In Iowa Senator Blaine is capturing county after county delegation to the State Convention, which meets on the 14th. The Kansas cyclone is coming East by North, with an occasional healthy breeze in Missouri. It is already blowing great gusts in Illinois, and has already knocked down a fence or two in Ohio.

Next to the bulldozers, the worst enemies of the colored people in the South are the vindictive and illiterate justices of the peace who interpret the law to suit themselves and enforce it with merciless severity. It seems almost incredible that such flagrant wrongs can be perpetrated in this enlightened age, but in States where elections are carried by intimidation and violence every form of injustice is possible.
