Eggs for sitting should be from healthy birds, not related. Asches or salt-peter, if applied in time, will hold the onion maggot in check.

T. L. Miller, of Beecher, Ill., recently sold three Hereford bulls for \$12,000 to go to Colorado. Cattle hoods at the present time are worth \$50 per ton. These hoods are now made into horn betters.

A correspondent of a Western paper recommends an ointment composed of equal parts of lard and gun powder as a remedy for scabs in horses, to be used daily until cured.

Mr. Joseph Mann, of Lebo, Me., has a fine pair of yearling steers, in which he feels a farmer's pride. They are of the Hereford blood, and girl 5 feet 8 and 9 inches, and weigh 1,790 pounds.

It is a good plan to cut scions for spring grafting the first open spell, and bury away in earth. The reason why so many fail with spring grafting is they cut the scions too late.

A lady correspondent of the Detroit "Post" watered her tomato plants with a weak solution of copperas (one pound to eight gallons of water), with the result that the fruit was two weeks earlier than on plants not so treated.

Grafting wax may be made by melting together four pounds of common rosin, two pounds of bees-wax and one pound of tallow. If to be used in the orchard in cool weather, add a quarter of a pound more of tallow, or a little raw linseed oil.

A successful potato grower advises planting potatoes cut to single eyes only, and reports a yield of 438 bushels of Early Rose to an acre, and a large bushel yield from twenty two eyes of another variety planted in hills three feet apart, one eye to the hill.

A correspondent of the "Country Gentleman" asserts that his corn has been earlier and the yield larger since he abandoned the practice of planting pumpkins with the corn. He thinks the increase in the corn crop has more than compensated for the loss of the pumpkins.

Mr. Oliver Detrymple, the great Minnesota farmer, intends to cultivate 30,000 acres of wheat this year. He will have twenty steam-threshers in operation with 135 reaping machines. Last year he employed 600 laborers and this year will increase the number to 700. Had he not better wait until the chickens are hatched?

Of the 178 boys in York county, Me., who contended last year for the prize offered by Stillman B. Allen, of Boston, for the most corn on an eighth of an acre, 138 raised an average of 100 bushels to the acre. One raised at the rate of 160 bushels, and several at an average of 140 to the acre.

An acre of swamp land in Massachusetts which was purchased for \$17 and ditched, cultivated, manured and crops harvested for four years at a total expense of \$100, produced during the same time potatoes and hay to the value of \$132, while the acre of land itself was made to be worth \$100.

Judge Cressett says he has had some experience in reclaiming pastures where brakes have taken possession. He had heard pigs suggested as a means of accomplishing this end; accordingly he fenced in an acre, turned in six hogs. He dug some holes about the piece, putting in some corn, and soon the hogs were rooting well, and they worked the piece all over, killing all the brakes. When the pasture was harrowed and some grass seed sown on it, it came into excellent grass. The remaining acres were tilled in the same way, and with equally good results.

Chicken Cholera.—When fowls do not have access to sharp gravel or coarse sand, being fed too much whole corn, will sometimes produce cholera. Now damp corn, or grass which has become succulent after protracted rains, if fed mostly to fowls, will produce cholera. The gas from fermented manure piles will cause it. If fowls drink filthy, stagnant water for a length of time, it will produce it. Wheat screenings containing much smut will get fowls out of condition, if it will not produce cholera. Sometimes when too many potatoes are used with corn meal and wheat bran dough, cholera will be produced. In using potatoes, add a tablespoonful each of salt and cayenne pepper to two gallons of meal and bran and potatoes.
