To be handy with the needle, is one of the sterling accomplishments of every educated woman. To be able to take the "stitch in time," is worth all the time and trouble that is required to learn the art. Like many other arts, and the may others, which we come to do without special thought, the learning to sew is a slow process, and should be begun while the child is still quite young. The girl should not only have the use of the thread, needles, and patchwork, but be instructed how to take the stitches, turn the corners, and do the various things connected with needlework. Receipts.

One camphor is a speedy remedy to clear cockroaches. Boiling harden the muscular fibres and flesh of fowls. We doubt the value of feeling them to the barn-tarts. Cooked eggs won't boil. When you come in contact with hot shells dissolves partnership quickly. A teakettle of lime, sweeps me off that you eat, and thoroughly with soft soap; an oyster shell in the bottom is there, and it will do free from lime.

can be made to look as well.

A mixture of kerosene and lard will remove lice if it is well applied. It should be used all over the skin and brushed into the hair thoroughly. It will be more effective if some sulphur is added to it. Take one pound of lard, one pint kerosene oil and four ounces flour sulphur; rub these well together.

Restoring Carpet.

The question of cleaning and restoring carpets is one that bothers many housekeepers, as it is the season for spring house-cleaning. The following hints are sent out by an exchange: A table spoonful of ammonia in one gallon of warm water will often restore the colors of carpets, even if injured by acid or alkali. If a ceiling has been whitewashed with the carpets down and a few drops should fall, this will remove it. Or, after the carpet is well beaten and brushed, soak with ox-gall, which will not only extract grease, but freshen the colors. One pint of gall in three gallons of warm water will do for a large carpet. Table and floor oil-cloths may be thoroughly washed. The suds left from a wash, when ammonia is used, even if almost cool, cleans floor cloths well.

Poultry Notes.

Tomatoes are a wholesome food for hens, and they like them too. Chopped onions, with a little ginger mixed in, are said to be a sure cure for chicken cholera. Poultry houses need not be expensive but should be built snug and warm.

Gives hens constant access to lime.

Hens must have the raw material in order to manufacture shells; they cannot make them out of nothing.

A few camphor pills about the size of a garden pea are recommended as a sure cure for gapes.

A French writer recommends the use of green bushes or flowering shrubs in the hen house, with the view of imparting a pleasant smell, and giving a more natural and home-like appearance to the place.

Paint the inside walls of a corn house with coal tar and it will drive weevils from the corn. It costs but a few dollars a barrel will last several years in hen houses and corn houses.

Barn-yard measures are considered more hurtful than useful for gapes. Polish should form a part of the grape manure and nitrate of potash is the most valuable.
