Fire Record.

Pittsburg, had a six acre fire one day last week.

The Jersey forest fires have broken out again. The people are helpless with despair.

It is stated that the fires in the northern oil field destroyed \$1,000,000 worth of property.

The lumber yard of Barber & Henderson, at Ashbury Park, New Jersey, was partially destroyed by fire a few days ago.

Fire destroyed Palen's saw and blind factory, at Kingston, on Monday night. Loss, \$25,000; insurance, 4,000.

A fire started in the woods near Cedarville, New Jersey, has destroyed Amos Lewis' house and a small farm house.

Wood fires are spreading rapidly in the mountains around Kingston, N. Y., and the whole brow of the Catskills is one mass of smoke and flame.

The forest fires around Millford, Pike county, have destroyed over 3,000,000 feet of lumber, besides large quantities of growing timber.

The fires that have been desolating the Pocono and Moosic mountains have advanced within a short distance of Scranton, and that city is so filled with smoke that it is impossible to see more than two or three blocks.

ANNEAPOLIS, Md., May 19.—A destructive fire in the Third district near Annapolis, which has been raging since Sunday, destroyed one thousand acres of woodland, entailing heavy losses to nearly a dozen farmers. The origin of the fire is unknown.

HARRISBURG, May 17.—Quite an excitement was caused this morning by fire breaking out suddenly in a back building of Starr's grocery store, Ridge avenue, above Broad.

Forest fires have raged furiously along Bear Creek, Luzerne county, and vast quantities of lumber have been destroyed. On Sunday night the fire reached Bear Lake and quickly consumed a barn with its contents, consisting of hay, corn, and farming implements, and an ice house containing sixty tons of ice.

The Bradford Era tells briefly an account of how some recent fires occurred in that region. A man visited a 25,000-barrel oil tank with a naked lantern and Red Rock was burned. A man built a fire near a well and went to dinner; the destruction of Row City was the result.

HENRYSVILLE, May 13.—The village of Stuyvesant, eleven miles above this city, was destroyed by fire this morning. The loss is over \$200,000. Among the buildings burned are the post-office, house of the New Jersey Ice company, railroad depot, Chapp's hotel, the Stuyvesant foundry, St. Mary's church, and all the buildings on both sides of the railroad track, covering a radius of over a square mile.

COUDERSPORT, Pa., May 19.—A fire broke out here a few minutes before 3 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, and before the astonished citizens could recover from the shock it was sweeping away building after building.

ELMONTON, Pa., May 23.—Elenburg, once the liveliest and most prosperous town of the lower oil regions, is again in ashes. At 9 o'clock last night the cry of fire startled the citizens of this place.

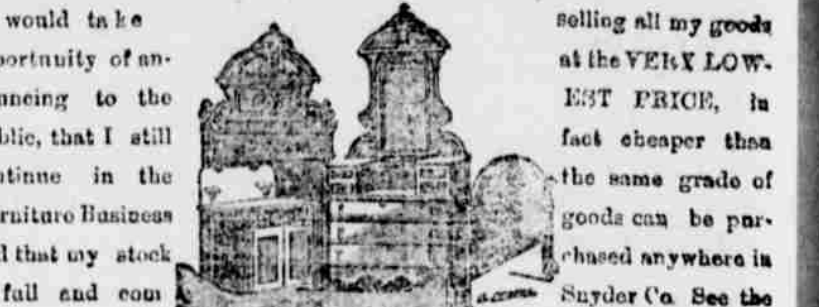
