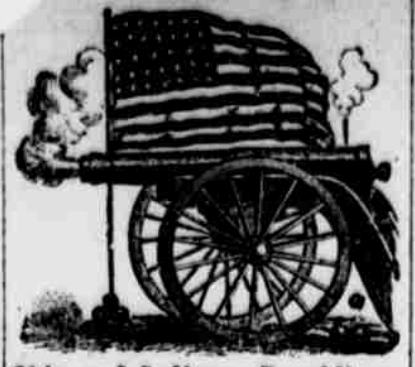

Our Rooster Feels O. K.

It looks like a tidal wave. The October States come with a glorious Republican triumph and clear the way for a conclusive Republican victory in November. The reports are of the most inspiring character. Ohio goes Republican by upward of 25,000. Indiana, for the first time in the October elections of ten years, throws its great weight into the Republican scale. Both of them outstrip the best Republican expectations, and mark an irresistible Republican sweep. The signs are unmistakable. At last the patriotic North is thoroughly aroused, and proclaims that the Government shall not pass into the hands of the solid South, and of those who would strike a deadly blow at the business and industrial interests of the land.

The Sectional Party.

The Republican party did not punish a rebel or confiscate an estate. By enfranchising the blacks it largely increased the political power of the South. It restored every traitor to the privilege of the franchise. It granted amnesty to every man who asked for it. It permitted those who had lifted their hands against the Government to resume control of their States. It has made liberal grants to the South. It has done everything except to surrender to the most vital principles. And yet it is denounced as waging a crusade against that section.

Wade Hampton asked the people of the South to "consider what Lee and Jackson would do were they alive," and he tells them that the principles for which they fought for four years. General Fitzhugh Lee, standing in the presence of a Confederate monument exclaims: "If you desire that those heroes buried yonder shall not have died in vain vote the Democratic ticket." Attorney General Field of Virginia stirs the passion of his people by declaring: "We killed a great many Yankees during the war, and I wish we had killed twice as many more—enough to have given us the victory and our cause success." Mr. Joe Blackburn goes into Ohio and proclaims: "Let the Radicals howl about a solid South. She is solid, thank God. She was solid for Jeff Davis in 1860, and she will be solid for Hancock in 1880."

These are all representative men—not irresponsible ranters, but leaders of the Southern sentiment. And yet the Republican party is assailed as sectional because it urges that it is not safe to hand over the Government to those who boldly proclaim these utterances. According to this theory it is not sectional for the South to make itself solid by force fraud and menace all the safeguards of the country, but it is sectional for the Republican party to state the truth and oppose the danger. Away with such mockery of reason.

Mr. John Lanahan, a well-known dealer in scrap iron, of Pittsburg has left the Democratic party. In a letter explaining his course he says: "I have been thirty years in this country, and have always voted with the Democrats. I now admit that I never gave the subject of politics the consideration its importance required, but I have recently reasoned with myself, and the result is, I have concluded to cast my vote for Garfield. I am convinced that a change in the National Administration would throw us back to the financial and commercial depression from which we are now gradually and surely recovering."
