The engine looked as if it was plowing through a snow-drift as the frightened sheep piled upon the track, but when it had finished its work, Everheart was \$1500 out of pocket, 108 sheep having been killed and ninety-six badly crippled.

A portable saw mill at Red Bank, Pa., exploded on Wednesday last killing three men. Ten thousand loaves of bread were distributed to the poor of Pittsburg on Christmas.

Connettsville shipped thirty-three thousand pounds of cheese to Pittsburg on Christmas. Christian K. Ross, father of the missing Charley, has spent \$60,000 in trying to find his son.

Over one thousand printing presses have been shipped from Philadelphia to France since 1876. Howard J. Reeder, of Easton, lost both eyes by a premature explosion of his gun while hunting.

One man was killed and three injured by an explosion of giant powder at Mauch Chunk on Friday. Mrs. Simms, of Slocomb, was burned to death a few days ago, her clothing taking fire while rendering aid.

Albert Magee, of Bradford, lost his life on Friday last by an explosion of nitro glycerine. His body was blown into fragments. Colonel J. J. Carter, of Bradford, has purchased one hundred acres of oil territory near Rew city, for which he paid \$90,000.

Nicholas Schwartz, of Brackway, Susquehanna county, aged over 70 years, fell into a pool of water on Tuesday and was drowned.

The Governor's Message. The biennial Message of Gov. Hoyt is a very lengthy document, and opens with congratulations to our citizens that Pennsylvania has, in many respects, realized the best human anticipations of an ideal republic, and that the law-making power has now only to deal with a stable and fixed social mechanism, the great frame-work of which is outlined in the Constitution, which may safely be said to be as well-balanced and adjusted a piece of governmental organization as any people have yet formulated.

In his recent message, Gov. Neill, of Idaho, makes the assertion that Idaho is becoming "a second edition of Utah," polygamy prevailing to an alarming extent. He wants it crushed immediately. The three divisions in which the State is carrying on its system of public institution—Public Schools, Normal Schools and Soldiers' and Orphans' Schools—is discussed at some length, and the views and recommendations of State Superintendent Wickham, in his annual report, are endorsed.

The Governor finds that the financial statement of the State exhibits a deficiency for the year ending November 30, 1880, of \$1,814,000, which he thinks by wise and judicious legislation may be provided for without the entailment of an onerous burden upon the tax-payers. One fourth of the Message is occupied with a discussion of the question of the duty of society to its dangerous and criminal classes, and the establishment of a Reformatory Prison, such as exists in other States, is recommended.

In conclusion, almost every important question in the internal policy of the State is treated upon, and in such a way as to lead the conscientious lawmaker to a clear view of his duties and responsibilities, and of what the people of the State expect of him. The Message bears the impress of careful thought and honest purpose upon the part of its author. We have only alluded to a few of its salient points, as the Message in its entirety is too lengthy for our space, and doubtless the majority of readers who care about parsing this whole have already done so.

The Legislature. For a week past all eyes have been turned in the direction of Harrisburg. The absorbing interest was in the Senatorial succession to Senator Wallace Galusha A. Grow and Henry W. Oliver were the leading candidates, with several dark horses hanging on the ragged edge. Both Grow and Oliver were confident, and it was an open question who was ahead until the preliminary caucus on Monday night of the organization of the Legislature, when John M. Pomeroy, of Chamberburg, was the Oliver candidate for Chairman of the caucus, and L. D. McKee, of Philadelphia, the Grow candidate. A vote resulted in 69 for Pomeroy and 51 for McKee. This result was, of course, a great disappointment to Mr. Grow's friends, who had confidently counted upon a decided victory.
