IMPORTANT TO BUSINESS MEN.—The Post Masters have received instructions from the Post Office Department to look out for the practice among some of the business men of writing matter on bills and invoices that is prohibited by law under the cheap postage regulations. Bills, particularly printed can be sent through the mail at the one cent rate, but the law positively prohibits any writing on the bill outside of the items charged, the price and amount. Such words as "please remit," "send by freight," or anything else in the nature of personal correspondence subjects the bill to double letter postage. The Postmasters have orders to enforce the law strictly and business men will do well to study the law carefully before sending bills out under the cheap postage regulations.
