

The grand old Republican party was never in a healthier condition than it is today.

Col. Thomas A. Scott has resigned the Presidency of the Texas and Pacific Railroad, and Jay Gould has been elected President to succeed Colonel Scott. Jay Gould has purchased Mr. Scott's entire interest in the Texas and Pacific, amounting to about \$4,000,000.

Another victim to trichinae is reported in Brooklyn. The victim was a raw ham, and the death is one of the most revolting that can be conceived of—the victim being eaten up alive. It is time that people learned that if they eat raw pork in any form, it is at the peril of their lives. Thorough cooking makes it as safe as any other animal food.

Nearly thirty thousand immigrants arrived at Castle Garden during the stormy month of March. This unprecedented number gives a forecast of what may be expected in the mild months of May, June, and July. Last year's immigration surpassed any on record, and yet the March arrivals were only a little over twenty-one thousand. We may look for a round half million before the year ends.

Secretary Wilcox, on Monday, issued the one hundred and second call for bonds, amounting to \$105,531,493, being the entire amount of six per cent bonds issued under the act of July 17, and August 5, 1861. Interest will stop on these bonds on the 1st of July, unless the holders request to have their bonds continued during the pleasure of the Government at 3 1/2 per cent per annum.

Unusual attention is being paid to political movements at Washington. Under Garfield, who evidently means to be President, with all that big word implies, the quiet spectator whose nerves were never shocked under Hayes' administration, must expect to see the political atmosphere charged with thunder clouds and electrical with lightning bolts every now and then, and the sunshine of peace pervades the country.

New York, April 14.—Assistant District Attorney Bell, in the General Sessions Court today, called to the bar James O'Brien, alias Robert, or "Bob," Lindsay, who during the last political campaign deposed that he knew H. L. Morey, the individual to whom it was alleged President James A. Garfield wrote what is known as the "Morey-Chinese" letter, and who subsequently confessed that he had prepared himself. He pleaded guilty to the indictment for perjury presented against him and Judge Cowing sent him to State Prison for eight years.

There are few people who realize the great advance that has been made in the art of ocean telegraphy, or who have an adequate idea of its perfection. A vessel in port is the Cambridge Oxford boat race rowed in England on Friday last. The National Associated Press despatch giving the result was transmitted from the point of the finish to the London agents' office and filed with the Direct Cable Company, who transmitted it to New York in twenty-seven minutes.—This is perhaps the quickest time ever made by any cable company, and as such is worthy of note.

The problem of rapid railway transit in this country has certainly been solved when an average speed of one mile a minute is made for the entire distance between New York and Philadelphia. Probably, however, if the average American citizen, who is content with nothing less than the speed of the wind when on the rail, would take a seat in the cab of "long legged No. 10," running between Philadelphia and New York, he would be thoroughly cured of his insane desire to "crawl" before he had made a lap of ten miles. The trial of the Russian assassins of the Czar was concluded on Saturday. They were all found guilty and sentenced to be hung. There are six prisoners: Kibulshidish, the assassin; Raschoff, who threw the first bomb; Michaloff and Teibhoff, chief conspirators; Hazy Helfmann, who kept the conspirators' lodging house; and Sophie Pinesky, who participated in the preparation of the Moscow manifesto and in the murder of the Czar. Her sentence will be admitted to the Czar for confirmation, because she is of noble birth.

The London Times carries a report out of Ohio, that in the 23rd year since the earthquake recently occurred, it has visited the southern part of the island and found a town of 12,900 inhabitants, and the village of Moxaster, Virginia and Philites masses of ruins. Not a single house has escaped. English and American physicians are assisting the survivors. Since the first shock several more have occurred. On Monday a violent shock, lasting four seconds, caused the falling of houses on all sides.

If Mr. Spear's report that General Longstreet will be nominated for the Georgia Marshalship is well founded, President Garfield will give another illustration of his knowledge of the treatment demanded by the Southern Republicans. It will be an evidence that to native Southern Republicans, as far as possible, will be entrusted the Federal office within their jurisdiction. General Longstreet has suffered much for conscience sake, and no Georgian more thoroughly enjoys the confidence of the whole country.

The Scranton Reporter is a friend of the members of the Legislature that the proper way to meet Attorney General Palmer's opinion is to make a legal test of it. "This will be a good deal more creditable than the message of daily resolutions charged with bitterness against the Attorney General, and leaving the motives of the Legislature itself open to question by those who are inclined to engage in that business."

The Bradford Era says: "Assemblyman Fannce uttered a truthful sentiment when he stated in the House that to be in contempt of this Legislature would not injure him with his constituents, but rather be regarded to his honor. If the Legislature continues to waste the time of the people in their effort to punish Attorney General Palmer for his decision, it will soon be beneath the contempt of all honest people."

Members of the House still lingering in Washington improve the comparative leisure by keeping up an active canvass of the Speakership. The West presents many candidates, but will probably fall in all of the West. We doubt if Judge Kelley will accept the position if tendered. He expressed himself to that effect recently on the floor of the House when the temporary occupancy of the chair was in question. This candidate who will have from the first the strong support is undoubtedly Mr. Hiesch of New York, whom unless all signs fail will be the next Speaker of the National House of Representatives.

The struggle between the majority and the minority parties in the Senate, which will be somewhat lively, is being anxiously watched at the South, where, as our Washington despatch says, there is a Minnie in every State, who only waits his opportunity to break his present party bonds and lead the new dispensation. The knowledge of this fact is the secret of the desperation of the Bourbon. Even Lamar of Mississippi, first enter as the country has come to regard him, despairs of the future of his nation with its political selfishness. The Vicksburg Herald is outspoken in favor of a Liberal movement at the South which shall substitute enterprise for sloth and banish Bourbonism for progress. In Tennessee there is every indication of a popular upheaval. The Memphis Herald, one of the ablest Southern journals, advocates the retirement of worn-out issues and the acceptance of Northern ideas. In fact, the whole South is quickening, and a Republican victory in the pending struggle in the Senate will give birth to an entirely new and healthy spirit in its business as well as its politics.
