*stress upon the claim that in cheapening books so vastly it is against the*

*interests of American authors. The*

*Revolution boldly meets this assertion*

*by statements as follows: 1st. That*

*American authors rarely receive*

*from publishers a copy-right, exceed-*

*ing 10 per cent upon the retail price*

*of their books actually sold. 2d. That*

*at least one-half, and probably more*

*than three-fourths, of the books*

*published by American authors have*

*been published at the author's ex-*

*pense, the publishers furnishing no*

*money, and paying no copy-right, but*

*themselves receiving a large per-*

*centage up in sales made. 3d. That*

*they propose henceforth to pay to*

*American authors for acceptable manuscripts a*

*copyright of 15 per cent, instead of 10*

*per cent, and they claim that their low*

*prices, and immense sales resulting*

*therefrom, are far more in the interest*

*of authors than much larger copyright*

*on the commonly limited books.*

*3d. That all the books profit \$1.*
