The increase in the number of migratory birds of late years is at least partially due to the protection thus given them.

THE CONCERT.—Last Thursday night's concert, under the management of Prof. Kurzenknaus, of Harrisburg, was one of, if not the grandest musical affair ever offered the Snyder county public. Felix Smoker's new horse frightened at a locomotive near Lewistown Junction on Saturday morning last, and upsetting the buggy threw Mr. S. out, the lines wrapping about his leg, by which he was dragged some distance. He was injured severely in the limb and slightly otherwise.

Two young men were arrested on Friday, charged with stealing copper kettle from the stable of Robert H. Junkin in the rear of Valley street during the night. They were taken before Esq. Shull and bound over for their appearance at court. These arrests have led to disclosures which are likely to implicate a number of others, boys and men, and possibly lead to a check on sundry parties who have been in the habit of buying almost everything without much inquiry as to where the articles came from. Without receivers of stolen goods there would not be much inducement for this petty thieving, and men would not go prowling about at night laying hands on whatever they can find, nor boys go about in open daylight, stealing every piece of iron left about a canal boat or skiff, even in some cases breaking off locks and chains. Let the whole gang, big and little, be brought up to the ring, and made to take a dose of penitentiary. Other arrests have been made and more to follow.
