The Cumberland Valley S. S. Assembly.

This already noted gathering of Sunday-School people is held annually on the Oakville Camp Ground, located in the very bosom of the beautiful and salubrious Cumberland Valley, under the auspices of an association of Christian gentlemen of various denominations, who receive no financial benefit whatever from the enterprise, but have contributed to it considerable of their time and means, their only object being to promote a higher standard of Sunday-School work in the surrounding territory by affording those engaged in this field the best possible opportunity to secure normal advantages at the least possible cost. This laudable undertaking speaks for itself, and the encouragement it has received from the pulpits, the press, and those for whom it is especially designed, exhibits a gratifying appreciation of the efforts of its projectors and supporters. Their promise to provide talent of the highest order for the work of the Assembly has in each instance been fulfilled heretofore, and the programme for the coming session is beyond all that has ever before been announced. The exercises are, in general, of a two-fold character, embracing a Lecture Course and a Course of Normal Instruction. Both of these are confined strictly to topics bearing upon Sunday-School work or Bible Study. Nothing foreign to the purpose of the organization is admitted, and everything of a sensational rather than a practical type is excluded, while that which is deemed profitable is made interesting and attractive by the employment of the best talent and the expenditure of every means and effort.

The Session for 1881 will be held at Oakville, Pa., on the line of the C. V. R. R., about midway between Harrisburg and Chambersburg, July 13-20, a full week, instead of four days only as heretofore. The most thorough preparation is being made for the occasion.

The Lecture Course will be a leading attraction. It will be introduced by a most appropriate theme, "Danger Signal," which the lecture, Rev. P. H. Henson D. D., the leading platform speaker of the Baptist denomination in America, facetiously characterizes as "an fog's protest against certain dangerous tendencies in modern Sunday-School methods." Rev. A. L. Agnew D. D., the well known Presbyterian divine of Philadelphia, will follow on "Sabbath-Schools as Life-Saving Stations," prepared especially for the occasion, and on the evening of the same day Lyman Abbott, D. D., editor of the Christian Union, will discuss the theme, "Why I Will Teach in Sunday-School." On the second day Dr. Agnew will lecture on "Mental Philosophy as related to Sabbath School Teaching," also specially prepared for this Assembly; Dr. Henson will follow on "What Must Lie Back of Teaching," and at night Dr. James Strong, President of Drew Theological Seminary, who has spent a large portion of time in personal explorations of the East, will lecture on Oriental Lands, illustrating his subject by first-class-illustration views taken by himself and party. On the third day Dr. Abbott will review "The New Version of the New Testament"; Col. Robert Cowden, of Gallion, O., who has a national reputation as a successful Sunday-school Superintendent, will probably occupy the platform, and Dr. Strong will give another illustrated lecture. It is designed to make Sunday a day holy inspiration. There will be sermons or addresses by eminent ministers, and in the afternoon a Sunday School Session, conducted by Col. Cowden, the current lesson of the International Series to be used. The remaining days of the session are not fully arranged for as yet, but it is certain that Dr. Thomas Ward will deliver a brilliant lecture, entirely new in this region, entitled "Waste"; that Rev. J. Vance, of Carlisle, Pa., who has made the wonderful career of Livingstone a study, will connect the Missionary feature of Sunday-school work with the Assembly by discoursing on "The Finger of God in Africa"; that Rev. A. H. Stedeker, Pastor of the First Lutheran Church of Harrisburg, Pa., will treat some practical theme; and that Rev. C. S. Duffield, Pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Altoona, Pa., will present "Christ, the Representative Human Redeemer, in the Light of Modern Science," while it is probable Bishop Warren Dr. McCaughey, and other prominent divines will participate.
