One of those present in the chamber of death at the fatal moment thus describes the scene :

"There were present when the President awoke only General Swaim and Col. Rockwell ; but the atten la ants were speedly summoned. Mrs. Garfield. Dre Bliss, Hamilton, Boyuton and Col Rockwell and Prisvate Secretary Brown reached the room within a few madents. Mrs. Gartield sat up in the ballei le holding the hand of her dying husband. Dr. mamilton stood on the opposite side, and the others were grouped about the President, who was unconscious, even before the first of those summoned reached the chamber. No other persons were in the room. Mrs Col. Rockwell, with her daughter and Miss Mollie Garfield, est upon a lounge in the hall. The colored servants of the Francklyn cottage were grouped outside the door of the sick room peeping in.

The President was breathing beavily, and at increasing intervals. The Doctors whispered to each othor two or three ti nes, but aside from this no word was spoken. Two or three sighs, and some suppressed sobbing, was heard from the groups of negroes in the door, but all the rest were silent. The heavy breathing of the President continued for about fifteen minutes, and then ceased. Consciousness did not return. His death was absolutely painless. When all was over Mrs. Garfield quietly withdrew to her room. Dr. Hamilton e moothed the features of the dead President, and the other physicians and attendants straight.
