OUR LAMENTED PRESIDENT.

The Assassin's Bullet Proves Fatal! THE PRESIDENT IS DEAD! AT THE DEATH BED. THE PRESIDENT'S REMAINS.

At 10.35 p. m., Monday night President Garfield was pronounced dead. For nearly three months he has borne the most intense suffering with remarkable calmness and heroic fortitude. The prayers and hopes of the nation have been defeated. The highest medical skill has been baffled, and all that human affection could conceive was in vain. In humble submission the nation bows to the will of Him who holds in his hands the destinies of men and nations. One of those present in the chamber of death at the fatal moment thus describes the scene: "There was present when the President awoke only General Swain and Col. Rockwell; but the attendants were speedily augmented. Mrs. Garfield, Dr. Bliss, Hamilton, Boynton and Col. Rockwell and Private Secretary Brown reached the room within a few minutes. Mrs. Garfield sat up on the bed in holding the hand of her dying husband. Dr. Hamilton stood on the opposite side, and the others were grouped about the President, who was unconscious, even before the first of those summoned reached the chamber. No other persons were in the room. Mrs. Col. Rockwell, with her daughter and Miss Mollie Garfield, sat upon a lounge in the hall. The colored servants of the Franklin cottage were grouped outside the door of the sick room peeping in. The President was breathing heavily, and at increasing intervals. The Doctors whispered to each other two or three times, but asides from this no word was spoken. Two or three sighs, and some suppressed sobbing, was heard from the groups of negroes in the door, but all the rest were silent. The heavy breathing of the President continued for about fifteen minutes, and then ceased. Consciousness did not return. His death was absolutely painless. When all was over Mrs. Garfield quietly withdrew to her room. Dr. Hamilton smoothed the features of the dead President, and the other physicians and attendants straightened his limbs. Mrs. Garfield returned about half an hour later, and sat silently upon the bedside, the tears running in floods over her cheeks, but her whole demeanor manifesting her heroic spirit and self control in this the

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 20, 2.18 A. M. The body will be embalmed and an autopsy will take place to-morrow afternoon. Arrangements for the funeral will be made in accordance with the wishes of Mrs. Garfield. Nothing has yet been definitely determined, but it is expected that a special train will leave here on Wednesday next for Washington and that the president's remains will lie in state in the rotunda of the capitol during Thursday and Friday. On Friday evening it is expected that it will be taken to Cleveland, Ohio, where the body will lie in state during Sunday. The funeral will take place on Monday. The place of interment will be Lakewood cemetery at Cleveland, in accordance with a frequently expressed wish of the president in his life time.

J. M. Linn, Esq., of Union county, having received six votes out of the nine, was declared the nominee. On motion of Frank H. Wentz, seconded by Wm. S. Settle, the nomination of J. M. Linn, Esq., was made unanimous.

On motion, Calvin M. Hayes and Wm. S. Settle were appointed a committee to notify J. M. Linn, Esq., of nomination. J. M. Linn, Esq., was introduced to the Convention, and made a brief speech, accepting the nomination made.

On motion, a journal was read. A. M. INGRAM, Chairman. Attest: ALFRED HAYES, Sec'y. The above proceedings prove the harmony existing in the Judicial District, and the unanimity with which our esteemed and learned townsman was tendered the nomination. J. MERRILL LINN. J. Merrill Linn was born on the 18th of October 1833, and is consequently just 48 years old. He was admitted to the bar in September 1854 and having given several years to diligent study entered into practice in partnership with his father in 1858, and from that time on with the exception of four years in the army, and nearly a year to recruit from the malaria gotten in the Service he has been in active practice.

His father read under James Merrill as his preceptor in New Berlin, and settled in Lewisburg where he was in practice from 1826 until his death in 1869, and it was from his father's preceptor that he received his Christian name. From 1865 until the present time Mr. Linn has been in active successful practice noted for his careful and laborious preparation of his cases, his practice taking a wide range, both in his own county and neighboring counties and in the Supreme Court. After graduating at Lewisburg in 1851 then not 18 years of age he spent two years at Lancaster, in Franklin and Marshall College as tutor of the Languages, and while there studied the German language and is thoroughly acquainted with it and has been a reader of it for thirty years.

The platform adopted at Harrisburg is strong in its expressions of devotion to the suffering President, and emphatically endorses his administration. Its reference to reform measures is clear, concise and straightforward, and will receive the hearty approval of the party. The endorsement of Governor Hoyt's administration was timely as well as fearless, and there is not a Republican in the state but will approve of it. Altogether the declaration of principles is just what the people will endorse, because it contains nothing but what is fair, honest and truthful.

The Candidate for State Treasurer. Gen. Silas M. Baily was born in Uniontown, Fayette county, in this State, in 1836, and was educated at Madison College, in his native town. He learned the trade of a jeweller, and on attaining his majority went into business for himself, which he has since followed, with the exception of the time he was in the army. On the outbreak of the rebellion he was elected Captain. The company was attached to the 8th Pennsylvania Reserves, being known as Company I. He was soon after promoted to the rank of Major. At the battle of Gaines' Mills, on June 27, 1862, he was wounded, and did not return to duty until the night before the battle of South Mountain. He then assumed command of the regiment, which he retained, being commissioned a few months later as Colonel. At the battle of Antietam his horse was shot under him though he escaped without injury; but in the battle of Fredericksburg, on December 13, 1861, he was badly hurt by his horse falling. At this battle, the brigade under General Franklin was almost cut to pieces. The division was then sent to Alexandria, Va., and did provost duty until General Grant took command of the Army of the Potomac, when it joined him and followed him in all the subsequent battles, until that of Spottsylvania, when, the time of enlistment of the 8th Regiment having expired, Colonel Baily was mustered out of service, with his men. This was in June 1864. He took the regiment home, and subsequently President Johnson commissioned him Brevet Brigadier General for gallant conduct in the battles of the Wilderness. He returned to his business in Uniontown, where he was afterwards nominated for the legislature. The county being Democratic, he was defeated. Again he was nominated in Greene county, where he met with the same fate. Three years ago he was a candidate for Congress against Morgan Wise in the Twenty-first district, but was defeated by about 3,500 votes. This is all the part he has ever taken in active politics and on all these occasions he was put up merely as a figure-head for the Republican party in hopelessly Democratic constituencies. In June 1883, he was a delegate to the Republican National Convention at Chicago and was in that body a member of the "Old Guard" of 300 who stood by Grant and the Third Term from first to last. General Baily is a tall, compactly built man, with a full beard and a pleasant way of talking. He is a good conversationalist, but makes no pretensions to ability as a public speaker.

The late fire in the State of Michigan is of the most heartrending scene. Three counties in Eastern Michigan and about one hundred miles north of Detroit have been laid waste with fire. The long drought made forests and fields one mass of highly inflammable matter, and once having caught this the fire swept everything in its course. Towns, villages, farm-houses, barns, orchards and meadows became in a few hours blackened, smoldering mass. The bodies of men women and children who were overtaken in their flight are now being gathered and reverently buried, often only by strangers as entire families were destroyed together. Animals wild and tame perished by the hundreds. The three counties contained a population of 72,000. Most of the burned district was highly cultivated, beautiful farming land. In Seneca County the fire burned a clean swath sixty miles in length and from ten to thirty miles wide. Hundreds of square miles of territory were burned over, leaving many thousands of people in utter desolation. The Mayor of Port Huron, one of the cities which was totally destroyed, has made an appeal to the charity and generosity of the American people.
