President Arthur's Address. For the fourth time in the history of the Republic its Chief Magistrate has been removed by death. All hearts are filled with grief and sorrow at the sudden demise which has darkened our land, and the memory of the murdered President, his protracted suffering, his unyielding fortitude, the example and achievements of his life and the pathos of his death will forever illumine the pages of our history.

For the fourth time the office elected by the people and ordained by the Constitution to fill a vacancy so created is called to fill the Executive Chair. This was a of our fathers, foreseeing the most dire possibilities, made sure that the government should never be imperiled because of the uncertainty of human life. Men may die but the fabric of our free institutions remain unshaken.

No higher or more assuring proof could exist of the strength and permanence of popular government than the fact that though the chosen of the people be struck down, his constitutional successor is peacefully installed, without shock or strain, except the sorrow which marks the bereavement. All the noble aspirations of our forefathers are preserved which found expression in his life, the measures devised and executed during his brief administration to correct abuses and enforce economy to advance prosperity and promote the general welfare, to insure domestic security and maintain friendly and honorable relations with the nations of the earth, will be gathered in the hearts of the people, and it will be my earnest endeavor to profit, and see that the nation shall profit, by his experience.

Prosperity blesses our country. Our fiscal policy as fixed by law is well grounded and generally approved. No threatening issues mar our foreign relations and the wisdom, integrity and thrift of our people may be trusted to continue undisturbed in the present era of peace, tranquility and welfare. The gloom and anxiety which have enshrouded the country must make repose especially welcome now. No demand for speedy legislation has been heard; no adequate occasion is apparent for an unusual session of Congress. The Constitution defines the functions and powers of the Executive as clearly as those of the other two departments of the government, and he must answer for the just exercise of the discretion it permits and the performance of the duties it imposes. Summoned to these high duties and responsibilities and profoundly conscious of their magnitude and gravity, I assume the trust imposed by the Constitution, relying for aid on Divine guidance and the virtue, patriotism and intelligence of the American people.

The Duty of the Hour.—We have lost James A. Garfield, but we still have a President. Chester A. Arthur is now President Arthur, and it is the plain duty of all good citizens to give him their well wishes and support. He enters upon the duties of his office under circumstances so painful and peculiar that every step must be attended with embarrassment and difficulty, unless the people recognize their duty and give him the assistance of a generous confidence. His course since the fatal day on which the late President was struck down has been such as to command the admiration of even his enemies. An ordinary sense of justice will suggest to fair-minded men of every party and faction to suspend judgment until they have something to judge. The same vote that made Garfield President made Arthur his legitimate successor, and he should be made to feel that he has the same constitution behind him ready to hold up his hands and strengthen his purpose.—Philadelphia Press.

The feeling of sorrow at Mr. Garfield's death, of indignation against his murderer, and of sympathy for the bereaved family, seems to be scarcely less intense and general in Great Britain than it is in our own country. In many places bells have been tolled and flags hung half-mast high, and from every direction come messages of condolence. All this tends very powerfully to draw the two nations closer to one another and to strengthen the bands of friendship between them.

General Garfield died leaving no will. He had taken a \$25,000 policy on his life. His property consists of the farm at Mentor, which with his house at Washington is valued at \$35,000.

The Democratic State Convention met at Williamsport on Wednesday, and nominated Mr. Orange Noble, of Erie, as its candidate for State Treasurer.

James McCullion, a miner, was killed in the Lottsville shaft on Monday.
