President Arthur was fifty-one years old last Wednesday.

The potato crop of Clearfield county is larger this year than it has been for a long time before.

A number of noted Indian Chiefs are expected to visit the Indian school at Carlisle this month.

Rich gold, the grains as large as flaxseed, has been found in the sand at Little River, Tennessee.

The debt statement shows the decrease of the public debt during the month of September to be \$17,483,641.66.

Baron's circus train was wrecked at Long Point, Iowa, on Monday. Two engines were demolished and eight circus horses killed.

On Wednesday Governor Hoyt sent a notice to Insurance Commissioner Foster stating that he will not issue any more letters patent to mutual assessment insurance companies. He bases his action on the fact that as he construes the law, the business is not being conducted legally.

A violent storm of wind and rain did great damage in Knox county, Ohio, on Sunday. Fences and shocks of corn were blown away, and a number of dwellings were damaged and destroyed. There women of a party returning from church near Danville, were drowned while crossing a stream which was swollen by the storm.

The centennial celebration of the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at Yorktown, Virginia, promises to be, next to the centennial anniversary of our national independence, one of the most interesting events in our nation's history. The celebration begins on the 13th inst, and closes on the 21st, and the military and naval display will be very grand and imposing.

A locomotive now being built at the locomotive works in Paterson, New Jersey, is intended to create a revolution in steam, and do away with the burning of coal. This locomotive, which is nearly ready to commence running, will generate and burn hydrogen gas produced from water by the Holland process, and it is estimated that it will save 93 per cent, in the cost of fuel. The length of this engine will be thirty feet, and it will weigh forty-eight tons. The peculiarity in its construction is in the furnace and fire chamber and the number of flues for the passage of the flame. The flues are of copper, very small, and placed close together. The success of this locomotive is assured, and before the end of the month it will be running between New York and Chicago.

The Hagerstown Globe of a recent date tells of a case of swift retribution to a farmer in Washington county, Md., who, becoming displeased with the drought, cursed the Almighty for not sending rain to promote the growth of his crops. While the oath was yet upon his lips, or immediately after utterance, a paralytic stroke was received in the mouth, which so completely affected his power of speech that he has yet been unable to utter a word.

The bottom appears to have dropped out of the story recently circulated in Washington concerning an alleged plot to assassinate President Arthur. Mr. Bailey who first gave the information to the police, still adheres to his original statement of having overheard a conversation between two strange men, one of whom declared he would "shoot him in a month." The police and detectives have made every effort to reach the parties referred to, but have failed to find out the men or "him" spoken of.
