Taxes A First Lien. The attention of township authorities, collectors and County Commissioners is called to an Act of Assembly passed during the last days of the session of the Legislature. The act can be found on page 45 of the general laws of 1881. It makes taxes assessed upon real estate a first lien upon which they are levied - provides for a lien docket to be kept in the Commissioners' office, which is to be a notice to the whole world. In case a judicial sale takes place, the lien docket is to be satisfied before any money goes to the creditors. The Commissioners will want a new set of books, as the act covers all township and borough as well as State and county taxes. Collectors should study the act carefully and not get caught by the penalties of section three.
