The people of Dakota are agitating the question of the admission of that Territory into the Union as a State.

Dan Rice, of circus fame, is now on the lecture platform. He delivered a lecture at City Hall, Pittsburgh, on Saturday night, his subject being "The Fool Wise at Last."

Victoria Woodhull, with her sister, daughter and mother, is back from a five years' trip to and sojourn in England, full of praise for the English. She goes upon the lecture platform and her accomplished daughter will take the stage.

The Supreme Court has issued an order redistricting the State, which places fifty seven of the sixty-seven counties in the Eastern District seven in the Western, and the balance in the Middle District. It is said that this will require the Court to sit for nearly seven months of the year in Philadelphia.

A Georgia man who drank a quart of whisky a few nights ago, after a ride of 15 miles was taken from his wagon dead. There is no telling how much fun he might have gotten out of a judicious distribution of that quart of whisky, but he chose to have all his fun alone and it proved fatal.

"The American Book Exchange," a publishing firm which attempted the revolutionizing of the book trade by printing cheap literature, has failed after a costly experiment of three years. This failure will be deeply regretted by a large class of people who became extensive purchasers of its well-known and well-printed books.

Chris. Davis, a colored freed, who was in jail at Athens, Ohio, for an outrageous assault upon an elderly woman named Locke, who resided New Albany, in that State, was for city taken from prison a few days ago, and hung to the Hocking bridge where his dead body was discovered the following morning.

Guiteau, as described in Court by George Alfred Townsend: "A rascally skin, a little like a carpenter, with some reddishness overpreeding the generally yellowish dampness. The face was rather long and pear-shaped. The hair, the skin and the beard all seemed to be dusty and dampened, as though out of some graveyard."

The activity in railroad construction has caused a "boom" in locomotive building; prices have advanced and all shops are kept busy. An engine built for \$5,000 two years ago will now cost \$8,000 or \$9,000 and the demand for immediate use is so great that a completed machine brings from \$1,000 to \$2,000 more than one to be delivered in the future.

The petition for the probate of the will of the late George Lave the millionaire was filed on Friday last at New York. To his wife he has left \$25,000 cash and \$100,000 in United States bonds, the use of his house in the city and his country seat at Jackson, Washington county. He also leaves her all his furniture and directs that she be paid \$25,000 per year. To his son Samuel he gives \$10,000 per year, the rest of the property being equally divided between his four other children.

The New York Tribune insists that there is no remedy for the enormous expenditure entailed upon the country by the Arrears of Pensions bill. It says: "All that Congress can properly do is to resist every attempt to prolong the life of the unwelcome and promptly resort to a searching investigation of the entire pension list. The enormous immediate drain upon the Treasury cannot be prevented, but the continuous yearly leakage to pay fraudulent pensioners which the Arrears act has raised up in troops can be stopped. We believe it to be no exaggeration to say that such an investigation would reduce the pension roll to such an extent as to save the Government five or six millions annually without doing injustice to any person who has a right to the nation's bounty."

The Mormon and polygamy problem will probably be discussed soon after Congress meets. Delegate Cannon holds the certificate of the Secretary of State of Utah, while Mr. Campbell holds that of the governor. The Supreme Court having decided that Cannon is not a citizen of the United States, there would seem to be but little doubt that Mr. Campbell will get his seat. Cannon is a polygamist. It is the purpose of the republicans to object to Cannon taking his seat, and this will bring on a quarrel, as the democrats will probably support Cannon.

Considerable excitement prevails among the farmers near Deposit, N. Y., a small town located almost on the State line between New York and Pennsylvania, in consequence of the discovery of gold in considerable quantities in a ledge of rocks on a farm owned by Shapley Brothers. The miners and discoverers are John Dibble and Jerome Howkins, who have filed their claims with the proper State authorities. A ton of the rock has been assayed and found to contain \$23 in gold and \$12 in silver. As the rock is easily crushed it will at this rate pay to mine the gold. The excitement has extended into Susquehanna county and has been greater than that in the neighboring county of Wayne over the Gulp City oil well now boring there.

ANOTHER CRAZY MAN IN WASHINGTON—A desperado from Washington says, a man calling himself William Steward Hubbard or Albert Lyman registered at the Arlington Hotel, and again at the Ebbitt House, claiming to be from New York. At the Ebbitt he asked for the best rooms in the house; one was given him. Soon after he was found stripped to the flesh, and when asked for a deposit turned over an empty purse. He said he had come here to save the world and was to a certain extent Guiteau. He said he could solve the Garfield problem, but hadn't the time, and that his intentions were foiled when he was placed behind the bars.
