Hon. Marat G. Fisher.

The last Congressional contest in this district was perhaps one of the severest, most hotly contested of any in the state, and yet Mr. Fisher was elected by a greater majority than was ever before given any one.

He was compelled to meet and combat the schemes of one of the shrewdest, most unscrupulous and designing men in the district—a corrupting fraud that was poured out like water—a determined and desperate enemy abetted by sore-heads within his own party lines thus imposing on him a Herculean task from which men of less sterner material would have shrank and suffered defeat. But *full* is not in General Fisher's vocabulary—he vanquished the foe and for the second time saved the district—and it cost him a protracted illness from which he is just now recovering. Notwithstanding his broken health he has faithfully and efficiently discharged the duties of his high office.

A fair and impartial inspection of the proceedings in Congress show him always at his post of duty, and one of the most active, vigorous workers.

No district in this State, nor any district in any other state can point with greater pride to its Representative in Congress.

Will the party of the district ask General Fisher to permit his name to be brought before the people for re-nomination, first giving him the assurance that we are strong enough—sufficiently united and harmonious to take care of the result without calling him into a campaign of all-day-traveling and night-speaking—this done and it is possible he may yet be induced to allow his name to go before the people once more.

Shot Through the Body.

He was shot through the body—his young life might be saved if he were taken from the field and afforded medical and surgical aid, but he chose rather to die where he fell than take away a single gun when the conflict was raging—it was General James A. Beaver, and he said:

"Go on soldiers, I am not worth caring for; after the battle is over you may look after what remains of me."

That is independence enough for us.

Judge of the Supreme Court.

The Hon Charles Hower, of the Snyder county Bar, will be presented to the Republican Convention, which will assemble at Harrisburg May 10, next as a suitable nominee for Judge of the Supreme Court.

There is a manifest determination in the party, throughout the state, to nominate a strong, unexceptionable ticket—ticket that will baffle all peradventure, *etc.* It behoves us, inasmuch as Mr. Hower will be presented for nomination, to say, that he is an unusual law student—that he is an able and experienced lawyer—that he is an indefatigable worker, and will bring to the bench skill, ability and industry if elected.

Veto of the Chinese Bill.

After long and deliberate consideration, and not until the matter had been thoroughly discussed in Cabinet, the President has vetoed the bill suspending Chinese immigration to this country. The objection grew out of the length of the time during which such immigration was to be prohibited, twenty years, it is claimed being more in the nature of a prohibition than of a suspension and in violation of the spirit of the treaty. Senator Edmunds and others objected to this feature of the bill and withheld their support from it on that account only. If the time of suspension had been fixed at ten years, the bill which received a two-thirds vote in the House, and which lacked but one vote of two-thirds in the Senate, would have received a much larger support from those bodies and would undoubtedly have met with the approval of the President. Popular as the measure may appear at first blush, there can be no doubt that the principle underlying the anti-Chinese crusade is one of very wide application and its general adoption would produce some startling results.

Pennsylvania now sends flour to England, bells to China, plows to Pacifico, looms and spindles to Japan, cider presses to Germany, locksmiths' machinery to all the countries of Europe, steel ingots to Germany, provisions to France and tobacco to Mexico and Russia. Facts in trade like these indicate how great the State has developed in manufacturing capacity and resources under Republican rule of the country.
