To the readers of the SENTINEL I would briefly say that my Eleventh Father had led me for the eleventh time on British soil, with the honest intention to preach the Gospel of Christ to both the whites and Indians. I am thankful to Him I had my desire granted to a great extent. I attended our Conference at Berlin, Ontario, preached there once, and heard other good sermons by a number of brethren. We had a peaceable session. Since then I preached to the whites in different counties. Yesterday I was favored in God's providence, to pay my third gospel visit to the Ojibway Indians; they were very glad to see and hear me speak to them about Jesus; they were very attentive. In the forenoon I spoke to them direct in English; in the afternoon by an interpreter. Last evening an Indian led in prayer-meeting. My first interpreter is dead. They have been much benefited by the Gospel of Christ. May God bless all the honest missionaries.

I hope the seed which I did sow will richly to God's glory grow. And multiply an hundred-fold; May thousands yet for Christ speak bold.
