Account of School Boards. School warrants are issued in the order in which the annual certificates and reports are received at the Department. At the close of each school year the School Boards, without delay, shall place in the hands of the District Auditors a full itemized statement of the receipts and expenditures for the past year, including the assets and liabilities of the district of all kinds with all books and vouchers. A meeting of the Auditors should be arranged by the Board, to be held as soon as the school year closes, viz: first Monday in June. When the accounts are settled and audited, they are to be immediately published by the School Board, either by hand-bill or in two newspapers. As soon as the new School Board organizes (which can be done on the day of the auditors' settlement) the annual district report, affidavit and certificate shall be sent to WILLIAM MOYER, County Superintendent.

WM. CAMERON'S WILL. Hon. John B. Packer Fully Vindicated. In the Supreme Court, May 15, the decree of the Union county court in sustaining the will of the late Wm. Cameron was affirmed. The contest pushed so vigorously for the contestants is therefore of no avail, and Mrs. Jane Harrison will have to be satisfied with the legacy of \$180,000 which her father left her. The opinion of the Supreme Court is a very short one, and is as follows:

We affirm this decree upon the able opinion of Judge Elwell, which we adopt as the opinion of this court. It is not in the evidence anything to impeach the character of the gentleman by whom the will was drafted for integrity or professional propriety. Indeed, his conduct throughout was characterized by the nicest sense of honor. The counsel who supported the will were Joshua Comly, Hon. S. P. Wolverson and ex-Attorney General McVeagh.

The Body of Job's Goodfunder Found.

WEST BEAVER, May 22, 1882. About two weeks ago an insane man by the name of John Goodfunder from Union Co., aged 70 years came over to visit his niece, Mrs. Levi B. Traster of West Beaver, and on Tuesday evening the 19th inst. he went to Cross-grove Hall to an auction, and left that place after midnight and had not been heard of until Friday the 24th when he was found in the stream of Middlebrook. It is supposed he had his way and fell over the bridge and drowned his hat was found a few days before he was found further up the stream, by J. P. Fisher, N. B. Middlesworth, Esq., was notified and appeared, and summoned the following gentlemen as jurors: Adam Wagner, Dr. H. M. Uish, James Kalpeter, Solomon Mourer, Thomas Herberst and Michael S. Weiland, who held an inquest upon the said body, with a verdict, that the deceased came to his death by accidental drowning on the night of the 21st of May. The deceased, or unfortunate, man had been in the water about eight days—he was seen lying in the water the day previous to his being taken out by several persons but it was thought it was a scarecrow put in by some person as a joke on the one that took it out, hence he was left in it, but a little son of Levi J. Roubie being more inquisitive than the rest took a long look and turned it once and then his horror saw it was a dead man. His son being notified by telegram arrived the next day after he was found and had him buried in the Baker Church Cemetery, there to rest until next winter when he intends to have him taken home and buried beside his deceased wife.
