The War as Viewed by an American Missionary in Turkey.

We have much pleasure in calling attention to the following extract from a letter addressed by a clergyman, who for upwards of twenty years has labored under the direction of the American Board of Foreign Missions in Turkey. His brother, a highly esteemed member of this Society, has kindly written expressly for publication, the cogent argument, vigorous sense and profound religious feeling of the writer, will commend his observations, to which his familiarity with the true position of affairs in the East imparts additional weight, to the thoughtful consideration of every intelligent reader.

It is sad, plow, harrow, and tear the plowed furrow to fragments by re-harrowing—plowing shallow near the trees, and deeper more remotely. Apply a good coating of stable manure, with a hundred or two bushels of leached ashes, or fifty bushels of un-leached ashes or lime per acre—harrow these all into the soil and plow up as deeply as the roots will allow.—Thin out the weeds by removing all dead, decaying and badly stunted crooked branches, avoiding if possible the lopping of very large limbs. This treatment will impart new vigor to old trees, the crops will increase and the fruit will be much larger and greatly superior in quality.

Don't Kill the Birds.—As spring advances our youthful Nimrods feel the influence strong upon them to pop away their old fowling pieces at the birds.—Not that they want them for food—not that they do not relish their songs—but simply to gratify their insatiable propensity to destruction. But we beg the boys to refrain from this unchristian and coming alarmingly scarce in the vicinity of Hartford. We say alarmingly, for the armies of the palmer worm, caterpillar, and canker worm are alarmingly on the increase.

So important is this subject considered by agriculturists that the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture in Massachusetts has issued a circular urging upon farmers and others the cessation of the stringent law there is in that State against killing such birds. We have no doubt that the late ravages of our insect are owing to the wholesale destruction of their enemies, the birds.

Indiana Corn.—The crop of Indian Corn in 1854, as estimated by the Cincinnati Herald Record, will amount to at least five hundred millions of bushels. The increase from 1839 to 1849, in the production of this great staple, was at the rate of 58 per cent. The crop at the latter period measured 592,071,044 bushels; a less per cent of increase therefore, would make the crop of 1860 what has been allowed for that year.
