-SEC. 1, Be it enacted, &c. That the wilful malicious taking and 'carrying away of fruit, vegetables, plants, fruits, or ornament-al trees, vines or shrubs, in this Commonwealth, whether attached to the soil or not, shall be deemed and the same is hereby declared a misdemeanor, and may be prosecuted and punished as such under the laws of

this Commonwealth.
