Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Represente tires of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows: ARTICTE XI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or fallures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggre gate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time. shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand and to no other purpose whatever.
Exerion 2. In addition to the above limited pow-

deem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of

such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which

it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other ourpose whatever. Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. Section 4. To provide for the payment of the resent debt, and any additional debt contracted as foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking ler-24. fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof and of the income or proceeds of sale of stock owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war,

The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be piedged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation,

Section 6.
