

RESOLUTION.

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representa Resolved by the Senate and Louise of Representa-tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Gen-eral Assembly met, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

PIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constiution to be designated as article eleven, as follows: ARTICIE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Section 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted. and to no other purpose whatever.

Excress 2. In addition to the above limited pow-

er the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the state in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debta, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other urpose whatever. SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatover shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the according interest on such debt, and annually to reduce th rincipal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stock owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, hat may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war.

Any city conaining a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into onvenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal axable population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative."

At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the formation thereof."
The legislature, at its first session, after the adop-

ion of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts in the manner above provided; such districts to re main unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT.

The Legislature shall have the power to alter, re voke, or annul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be done to the corpora-
