

RESOLUTION.

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution ot the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth n accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constiution to be designated as article claven, as follows ARTICLE ME. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debts, to sup ply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Exerton 2. In addition to the above limited powsuch debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be cleated by, or on behalf of the state.

Section 7. The legislature shall not authorize any

county, city, borough, township; or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for; or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or SECOND AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows: ARTICLE XII. OF NEW COUNTIES.

No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one-tenth of its popoulation, (either to form a new county or otherwise.) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor than four hundred square miles. TRIED AMENDMENT.

From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words, " of the city of Philadelphia, and of each county respectively;" from section five, same article strike out the words, " of Philudelphia and of the several counties;" from section seven, same article, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," and insert in lieu thereof the words, "and no;" and strike out section four, same article, and in lieu thereof insert the fol-

dred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred. shall apportioned and distributed equally, throughout the state, by districts, in proportion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be dirided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as near as may be; each of which districts shall elect one representative." At the end of section seven, same article, insert

these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the for mation thereof." The legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this ameridment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

To be section XXVI, Article 1. The Legislature shall have the power to alter, re voke, or annul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, howbuged, that Emery's or Wieeler's Rullroad Horse ever, that no injustice shall be done to the corpora-

Will the Senate agree to the first amendment? The year and nays were taken agreeably to the provisions of the Constitution, and were as follows.
