. Here is one section of the law of the Territorial Legislature of Kansas, approved Sept-15th, 1855.

"SEC. 12. If a free person, by speaking or by writing, assert or maintain that persons. have not the right to hold slaves in this Territory, or shall introduce into this Territory. print, publish, write, circulate, or cause to be introduced into this Territory, written, printed, published, or circulated in this Territory. any book, paper, magazine, pamphlet, or cirly recognized and made the basis of its law, cular, containing any denial of the right of -there comes up à demand from the leading persons to hold slaves in this Territory, such person shall be deemed guilty of felony, and punished by imprisonment at hard labor for

a term of not less than two years." Here, freemen of Wisconsin, is "squatter sovereignty" practically carried out, which means Slavery in all its most odious forms. Here you have a man pledged to sustain this sam\* doct rine.
