Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Gen eral Assembly met, That the following amendment are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article

There shall be an additional article to said constitation to be designated as article eleven, as follows: ARTICTE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Secrees 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time shall never exceed seven hundred and lifer thousand

Secretor 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. Secrion 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works; from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stock owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war. invasion or insurrection, no part of said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguish-ment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dol-

larsa Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or associa tion; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, asso ciation, or corporation. Secrios 6. The commonwealth shall not assum the debt, or any part thereof, or any county, city, boroast or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to chable the state to repel invasion, suppress

domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of its present indebtedness. Section 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated dis-trict, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise to become a stockholder in any company, association or cornoration: or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, o party. SECOND AMENDMENT.
