It looks as though, since the alliance between the Sham Democracy and the Know Nothings, the former had imbilied some of the Native American prejudices of the latter, and meant to keep their Irish brethren at arm's length. Whether these demonstrations are intended as insults to the Catholic religion, or as a social proscription of Irishmen, we do not pretend to decide. The Lenox Banner Presentation

The ceremony of presenting the Price Banner from the ladies of Montrose to Lenox township, the home of Hon. G. A. Grow, (for the largest gain in the Republican vote since October) took place in the Court House at Montrose, on Tuesday evening, Nov. 18th, and was an occasion of much interest. A large number of persons, including many ladics, were in attendance. The Banner is a very beautiful one, trimmed and ornamented with much taste. On one side is the inscription, "The old Liberty Tree-let it Grove," and on the other, "Presented by the Ladies of Montrose to the Banner Townshin, Lenox, 1856."

NEGROES NOT CITIZENS .- A company of negro minstrels from the United States were recently traveling through Europe, and applied for passports. Mr. Marce denied the application, on the ground that they were not citizens. He says:

They, are represented in your letter as 'colored,' and described in the affidavits as 'black, from which statements it may be fairly inferred that they deepegroes. If this is so, there can be no doubt that they are not citizens of the United States.
