Washington, Sunday, Jan. 11, 1857. In diplomatic circles the great subject of conversation here is the appointment of the new Minister from England to reside near this Government. Ever since the departure of Mr. CRAMPTON, and more especially since the era of good feeling established between Paris and St. Petersburg, there has been a complete unity of sentiment and action among the representatives of the continents of Eu The ambassadors from France, Belguim, Holland, Prussia, Russia, and even Austria, have indulged in a freedom of expression on European affairs and American politics never known before. Nor do I believe the presence here of a British Minister will affect the decided anti-English tone of the diplomatic circle. The representatives from the Continental Powers are studious in their attention to Southern Senators and Representatives, and it is to be hoped the interest will be returned with a good will. We should seek, by all the means in our power, to promulgate, through these official sources.

If the people of the South are disappointed in this matter, the Democratic Party, as a national organization is at an end. This is no time for pleasing the enemy. Mr. Buchanan cannot strike hands with his declared opponents, or turn his back upon his tried friends. There are but two parties-a Northern and Southern party-and-Mr. Buchanan knows, or should know, which is constitutional in its principles, and patriotic in its ends.

We may accomplish a great deal, however, by building up alliances and friendships on the Continent of Europe. We may, through proper co-operation, do much, very much, for ourselves abroad. We cannot hope for any other solution of this Anti-Suvery prol-lem than the ultimate taiumph of Free Soil over every depurtment of Government. All efforts at resistance will be as idle in the future as in the past.

THE SPANISH COINS .- The Journal of Commerce, in an article correcting popular errors in relation to Spanish coins, says:-

"There is an error in regard to the intrinsic value of these coins, as proved by recent assay. The deposit at the Assay office of about \$900, on which there was a loss of 81-2 per cent., consisted entirely of smooth pieces, viously taken out. The result is, therefore, not a guide to those who hold an unassorted mass of the coin. Every sound quarter, on which the impression is distinct, is worth intrinsically from 26 to 27 cents, and is readily taken at 25 cents in exchange for Americoncerrency by all of the bullion brokers.— The same is true of the smaller pieces which are not worn smooth or clipped. Therefore, years. those dealers who advertise to receive them at par, will suffer on an average less discount upon them than upon uncurrent Bank notes.
