"The way to have healthy plants is to shorten in all straggling growth, and remove every leaf and flower as soon as the least symptom of decay is perceivable, washing them occasionally with warm water from the fine nose of a watering pot held high above them-thus giving them the benefit of a warm shower at any time or place. But the thing of all others most important is, to water them with hot water at all times; yes, hot to the touch, even beyond what is supposed to be prudent until after experimentand it is only necessary to watch the result on the health and vigor of the plants, especially when in bloom, to be convinced of the virtue of the 'grand specific.'"
