Snow Drifts and Blocked Roads.—We noticed last week, the case of Walton v. Fox, tried in the Quarter Sessions of Chester County, in which were involved the principles in regard to the rights of persons passing over private grounds, when the public roads are obstructed by snow or other obstacles. The case was this: Joseph P. Walton, the prosecutor, residing at Cochranville, started from his residence on the 30th of January last, for the village of Oxford, and finding the road impassable, on account of the heavy snow drifts, laid down the fence of Jacob Fox, the defendant, in order to pass through the field. To this the latter objected, and being excited, struck Walton with a spade, but missing him, hit the horse, causing him to back, breaking the shafts and upsetting the sleigh—throwing Mrs. Walton and child in the snow.—Upon the side of the defendant, the counsel argued that the owner of the land had an absolute right, under all circumstances, to forbid another person from trespassing upon it, and to resist and repel the trespasser—even when the roads are blocked with snow, and that Fox was justifiable in inflicting the blow upon the horse or the person of Walton. Upon the part of the Commonwealth it was argued that the road being in an impassable condition, Walton had a right to enter upon the premises of Fox—without the necessity of the case; but if this were not so, an assault with a dangerous weapon was not justifiable, if he had illegally entered upon his premises; whereas the evidence was that he had not entered upon the property of Fox.
