THE ESOLUTION OF THE PERSON Proposing Amendmentate the Con-

stitution of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Benate and House of Tapersenta tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in Gen-eral Assembly these That the following incomments the proposal to the Constitution of the Common wealth, in accordance with the provisions of the Confi-

article thereof. PIRST ANEXDREST. There shall be an additional article to anid consti-ution to be designated as article eleven, as follows: ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Exerces 1. The state may contract debts, to sup ply casual deficits or falleres in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggre-gate amount of such debts direct and contingent whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand lollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power

the state may contract delits to repel invasion, sup-press insurrection, defend the state in war, of to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which t was raised, or to repay such dobts, and to no othr purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. Except the debts above specified, in

sections one and two of this article, no dobt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. Secreta 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as a-foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such dobt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the sale, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned. by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assig ing to it any part of the taxes, or other revenue of the state, not required for the ordinary and curren vpenses of government, and unless in case of war,

invasion or insurrection, no part of the said sinking fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, natil the amount of such debt is reduced below the sum of five millions Section 5, The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be piedged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, assoiation, or corporation. Section 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, horough, township, or theorporated dis-triet, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, become a stockholder in any company, associa


