RESOLUTION

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representa tives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth

PIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution topic designated as article cleven, as follows ARTICLE MI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS. Secretaria. 1. Section 2. In addition to the above limited powe

the state may contract debts to repel invasion, sup press insurrection, defend the state in war, or to re deem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Secrion 3. Except the debts above specified, in

sections one and two of this article, no sect whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state. SECTION 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as a Beck, Bishop, Bower, Brown, Calhoun, Campbell, Chase, Cleaver, Crawford, Dickey, Ent, Eyster, Fauthoner Gilden, Hamel, Harper, Heins, ent debt. and any additional debt contracted as a foresaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time as time owned by the state, or the proceeds of the sale of the sale, or any part thereot, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund may be increased, from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be piedged, or loaned to, any individual, company, corporation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become Bow a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.

Section 6. The commonwealth shall not assume SECTION 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city. borough, or township: or of any corporation or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the state to repel invasion, suppress domestic insurrection, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the state in the discharge of any portion of the present indebtologies.

Section 7. The legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution,

SECOND AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constiaution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:-· ARTICLE XII.

OF NEW COUNTIES. No county shall be divided by a line cutting of over one-tenth of its population, (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express as-sent of such county, by a vote of the electors there-of; nor shall any new county be established, containing less than four hundred square miles. THIRD AMENDMENT.

From section two of the first article of the constitution, strike out the words, "of the city of Phila-delphia, and of each county respectively;" from section five, same article, strike out the words, "of seven, same article, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia nor any," and insert in lieu thereof the words, "and no;" and strike out "section four, same article," and in lieu thereof insert the

"Section 4. In the year one thousand eight handred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year there after, representatives to the number of one hundred, shall be apportioned and distributed equally, through out the state, by districts, in proportion to the num ber of taxable inhabitants in the several parts there of; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient number of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned it, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal taxable population as near as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative." At the end of section seven, same article, insert these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single senatorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxable population as possible; but no ward shall be divided in the formation

thereof."

The legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above provided; such districts to re-main unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

FOURTH AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional section to the first ar-flicte of said constitution, which shall be numbered and road as follows:

SECTION 26. The legislature shall have the power to alter, revoke, or annul, any charter of incorpora tion hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth; in such manner, however, that no injustice shall be dense to the corporators.


