ONE SETTLED PRINCIPLE IN THE APPLICA-TION OF MANURE .--- The principle to which we have reference is this, that the more intimately any manure is mixed with the soil, the greater will be its fertilizing effect. Where this cannot be done, on account of want of time or land might be advantageously imitated. This, practice, not yet laid before the American farmer, so far as we have noticed, consists in mixing guano intimately with an equal bulk of salt, in the hopper or otherwise, at the time of sowing it, sfier (or with the seed-drill.) The employer of this method thinks it helps the act of distribution greatly, especially when the guano is previously pounded fineand then the rapid assumption of moisture of soil. It is a practice well deserving of trial or adoption.

To PREVENT SPROUTS .--- Many trees are liable to throw up sprouts for yards around, and for years after being cut down, to the great plague and trouble of the owner of the crops and his own patience-such for instance ss locust, poplar, gum and others. To pre-vent this, all that is necessary, after cutting down the tree, is to bore a hole, say ten to twelve inches down into the stump, and fill with common salt. This will kill the living
