A Scene in the House of Representatives. One of those strange vigils that occur occasionally at critical points in the legislation of this country, occurred last night. The House of Representatives at Washington sat from 12 o'clock noon, yesterday, till half past six o'clock this morning—an uninter-rupted session of eighteen hours and a half. The pro-slavery and anti-slavery parties found themselves at issue on a point which might involve the whole controversy between them. The anti-Lecomptonites wished to come to a vote on referring the President's Kansas message. The Lecomptonites feared such a vote, and by trivial motions and ineffectual efforts to adjourn, contrived thus to protract the Bession, till, all parties being wearied out, a motion by Mr. Quitman was introduced by unanimous consent and adopted, by which the whole subject was deferred till Monday. when a vote is to be taken without further delay. The contest and its result seem to indicate a consciousness of strength on the part of the anti-Lecomptonites, and a corresponding consciousness of weakness on the part of the Lecomptonites, which argue well for the cause of freedom and popular

The great incident of this extraordinary session took place at about two o'clock this morning, when Mr. Lawrence M.
