The Hop. Wm. Montgomery, Democratic M. C. from the XXth District of Pa., composed of the counties of Washington, Fayette, and Green, has been renominated after a desperate contest, in spite of his early, steadfast, and effective opposition to the Lecompton fraud. His competitor for the Democratic nomination was a Mr. Lozier, whom, the question having been submitted to a direct vote of the people in each township, Montgomery beat by over 1500 majority.

On Friday last, the engineer of a fast train was arrested by the authorities of a "one-horse town," in Dauphin Co., Pa., for running through the Boro' at a greater rate of speed than is allowed by their ordinances. Having neglected, however, to give publicity to these ordinances, they could not impose any fine, and their discomfiture was aggravated by the malicious excuse of the engineer, that-"he didn't know there was, any town there!" . This, we think, was adding insult to the County.

.... The Charleston Courier's Key West correspondent says that Lieut, Pyne asserts that the reports of the outrages on American vessels have been much exaggerated, and in many instances false. The account of the Spaniard. |Contraband articles were found shoard which showed her to be a slaver, and she was accordingly sold as such.

In the House of Commons, on the 1st inst., Mr. Lindsay asked the Government if it was true that the United States vessels. in the Havana or western coast of Africa trade, had been fired into, boarded, searched. or detained by British cruisers; and, if so, by what authority or under whose instructions did the commanders of those ships so act? Mr. Fitzgerald said the Government and no official information on the subject, but he had reason to believe the reports had been exaggerated. 
