By the enactment of the English Bill, the Senate of the United States, the House of Representatives, and the President, have declared that her present population (say forty thousand) is sufficient to make a slave State. Is it not sufficient, then, to constitute her a free State?-If not what becomes of that equality under the Constitution, of which we have heard so much said by Southern statesmen? 
