THE ÆOLIAN HARP .- During the sammer season many persons might enjoy the melan-choly music of this instrument; we, therefore, give the following directions for its construction:-It consists of a long, narrow box of very thin wood, about six inches deep, with a circle in the middle of the upper side, of an inch and-a-half in diameter, in which are to be drilled small holes. On this side seven, ten, or more strings of very fine catgut are stretched over bridges at each end, like the bridge of a fiddle, and screwed up or relaxed town. with screw pins. The strings must all be tuned to one and the same note, (D is perhaps the best,) and the instrument should be placed in a window partly open, in which the width is exactly equal to the length of the harp, with the sash just raised to give the air admission. When the air blows upon these strings with different degrees of force, it will excite different tones of sound. Sometimes the blast brings out all the tones in full concert, and sometimes it sinks them to the softest murmurs. A colossal instrument of this description was invented at Milan, in 1786, by the Abbe Gattoni. He stretched seven strong iron wires, tuned to the notes of the gamut, from the top of a tower sixty feel high to the house of a Signor Moscate, who was interested in the success of the experiment; and this apparatus, called the "giant's harp," in blowing weather yielded lengthened peals of harmonious music. In a storm this music was sometimes heard at a distance of several miles.

This substance is a morbid secretion of the liver of the spermaceti whale, and is general ly used, in its alcoholic solution, for a perfume. It is more often found in whales of a weak and lean appearance, indicating that the ambergis is a product of disease. It is usually found in lumps of from one to thirty pounds in weight, and the largest piece hitherto known, weighed 182 lbs., and was bought by the Dutch East India Company, of the King of Tidore. Another piece from inside of a whale near the Windward Islands was sold for £500 sterling .- New Bedford Mer.


