There having been no outstanding appropriation applicable to this purpose, I could not advance any money on the agreement,therefore recommend that an appropriation may be made, of the amount necessary to

Other captures of a similar character may, and probably will, be made by our naval porces, and I earnestly recommend, that Congress may amend the 2d section of the act ent Republican. March 3d, 1832, so as to free its construction from the ambiguity which has so long existed, and render the duty of the President plain in executing its provisions.

I recommend to your favorable regard the local interests of the District of Columbia.-As the residence of Congress and the executive departments of the government, we cannot fail to feel a deep concern in its welfare. 
